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English Beauty To Be Queen Of Apple Blossom Festival

Miss Elizabeth Jane Henderson, 20, daughter of Admiral Sir Nigel Henderson, and Lady Henderson, of Winchester, England, will be Queen of the 39th Shenandoah Apple Blossom Festival here on April 28-29-30. Miss Henderson's father and mother are now in Washington, D.C., where her father is Head of the British Defense Staffs in the U. S. A.

The Apple Blossom Queen-elect, a gray-eyed blonde, will arrive in Washington for the Easter holidays and will remain in this country until after the Apple Blossom fete. She is no stranger to the United States, having attended school in Massachusetts, but Virginia's Winchester will be new to her. An older sister, Roslyn, is now working in Washington.

Miss Henderson, described as a young woman of charm, beauty and dignity, was educated at St. Mary's School, Wiltshire, England, and then took post-graduate work, as an exchange student, at Miss Hall's

School, Pittsfield, Mass., where she majored in French, German and history. Currently, she is attending the Queen's Secretarial School in London and is specializing in typing and shorthand in both French and English, preparatory to a career in the diplomatic service, the United Nations or an allied field.

Two years ago, Miss Henderson was presented at Buckingham Palace. In her spare time, the Apple Blossom Queen-elect enjoys horseback riding. She also likes to dance, ski, fish and play tennis. The Henderson home near Winchester, in the south of England, is "Mill House," but the Queen-elect and her family frequently visit in Scotland where they have farms.

More than 150,000 persons are expected in the "Apple Capital" for the coronation of the Queen, the springtime Pageant, the Grand Feature parade and other Apple Blossom events.

Wrecks In Area Up 13.5 Per Cent On Last Year; Included 38 Fatafs

Figures released today by the State Bureau of Traffic Safety show that 4,005 traffic accidents were recorded in Luzerne County during 1965.

This figure represents a 13.5 per cent increase over 1964 when 3529 accidents were posted. Statewide the number of accidents for 1965, was 213,769 for a 16.2 per cent increase over 1964. Total vehicles involved in these accidents Statewide were 376,664.

Commissioner of Traffic Safety Harry H. Brainerd and his statistical staff reported that figures available at the time of this report show that of the total number of accidents in Luzerne County, 43 persons were killed, or 4 less than in 1964. Included in this total are 25 rural deaths and 18 urban deaths.

A quick comparison with Dallas Posts of 1964 and 1965 reveals that highway deaths in the Luzerne County portion of the Back Mountain were down in the latter year, eight traffic fatalities in 1964, but only five in 1965. However, in 1965 there were five deaths in nearby areas of Wyoming and Columbia counties, three at Bowman's Creek, one at Beaumont, and one (a Shavertown man) at Red Oak.

In a complete breakdown of the 4,005 traffic accidents, Commissioner Brainerd reported there were 38 fatalities, 1363 non-fatalities, and 2604 property damage accidents. Of the 2604 property damage accidents resulting from motor vehicle mishaps, Mr. Brainerd reported that pocketbooks of Luzerne County citizens were hit to the tune of \$2,106,600.


