Dallas Women Install Officers

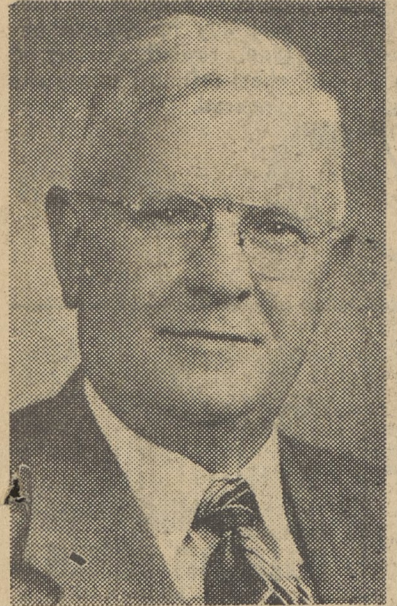

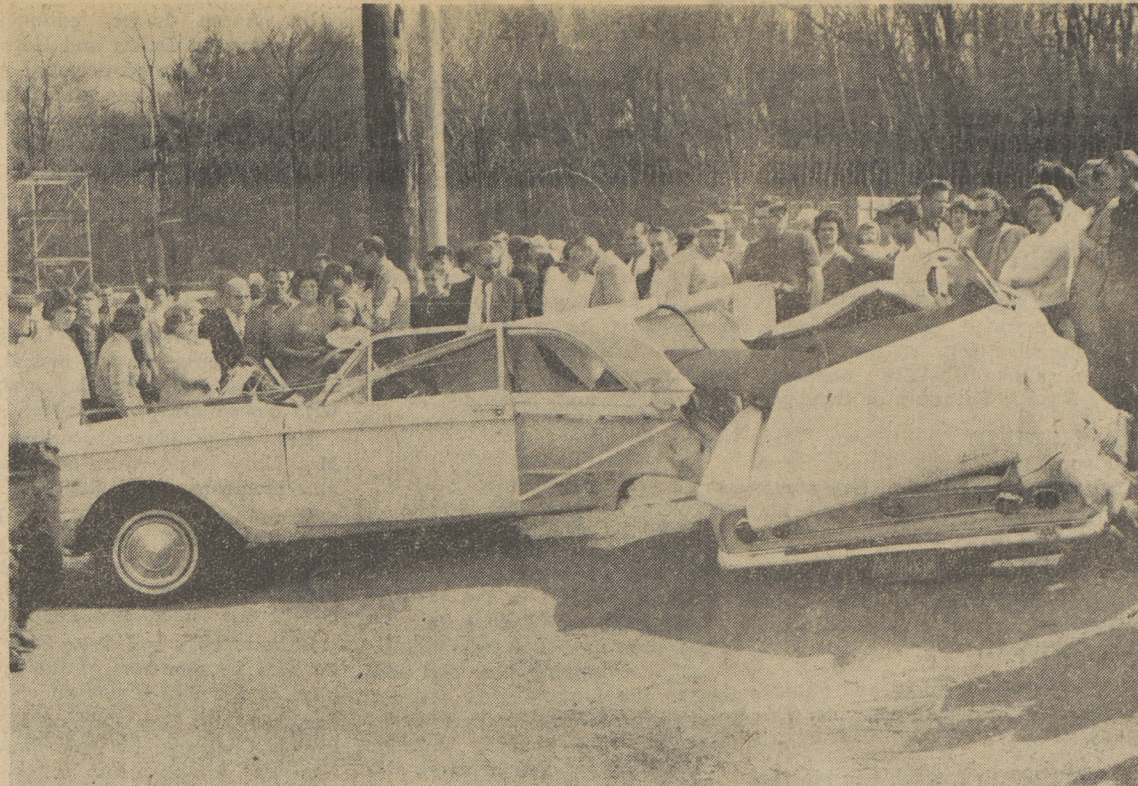
Shavertown First Aid Courses Start April 27

Car Peeled In Half, Four People Injured

Torn like cardboard on impact, this late-model Comet came within inches of being a tomb for two occupants, Julie Kapral, 19, of Courtdale, and Jane Rifenburg, 19, of Luzerne, in a crash by Forty Fort Dairy Bar on the highway Sunday.
Speeding Chevrolet convertible of Harry Sweppenheiser Jr., 19, of Kunkle, struck Miss Kapral's car amidships just behind the driver's seat as she was turning left on the highway around 2:35 p.m. and broke it like a toy.
So little metal remained tying the

two pieces of car together that Dallas Fire Company washed the road of gasoline anticipating the remnant might be severed by acetylene torch for easy transportation.
No one was killed although both girls in the struck car suffered back injuries, cuts and abrasions.
Northbound Kapral car was making a left turn from the inner lane when struck by Sweppenheiser's car, which was southbound. Sweppenheiser was thrown out of the car onto the pavement. Passenger, Dorothea Lyons, 16, of Noxen re-

ceived light injuries, Sweppenheiser himself multiple lacerations around left eye, abrasions of knee and leg.
A large crowd gathered immediately. Two girls remained in the front seat until arrival of Dallas ambulance which took them to Nesbitt Hospital for admission. Sweppenheiser, ambulatory, and Miss Lyons were taken in Kingston Township ambulance. Dallas Township police investigated.

College Misericordia's Dean, Sister Marianna Gildea, R.S.M., has been designated to receive the Amita Award for Achievement in the Arts and Professional Fields on Saturday evening, April 23, at the Biltmore Hotel, New York City. The Amita or American Italian Association is a charitable organization founded in 1956. Since then the association has awarded one hundred and eight women for their contributions to the betterment of American society and granted scholarships to deserving young women. Sister Marianna will be one of the first non-Italian American women to receive the Amita Award according to the policy inaugurated in this tenth year of Amita's history.

Sister Marianna received the Bachelor of Arts degree, summa cum laude, at College Misericordia, the Master's and Doctoral degrees from the Catholic University of America. Her special field of study is French with minors in Italian and Medieval Latin. She was an instructor in French at the Catholic University and at the Catholic Sisters College, Washington, D.C. during the year 1942-43.
