Jay A. Martin Is At Border Near Munich

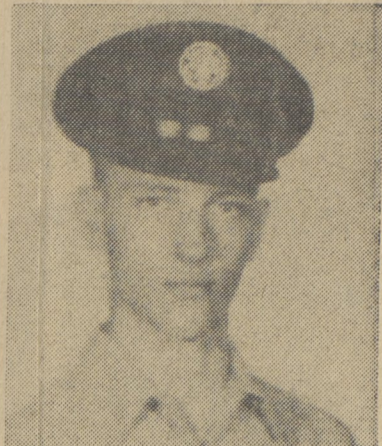
Pfc. Jay A. Martin, son of Mrs. Mildred Martin, Sweet Valley RD 1, is stationed near Munich, in a border camp.

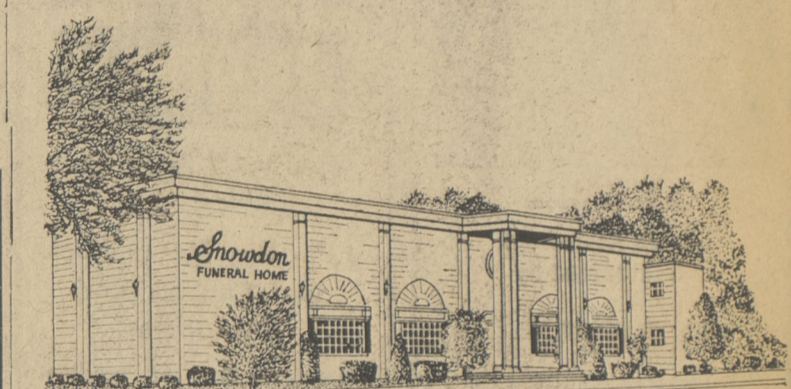
