Methot is a Junior at East Stroudsburg State College majoring in English.

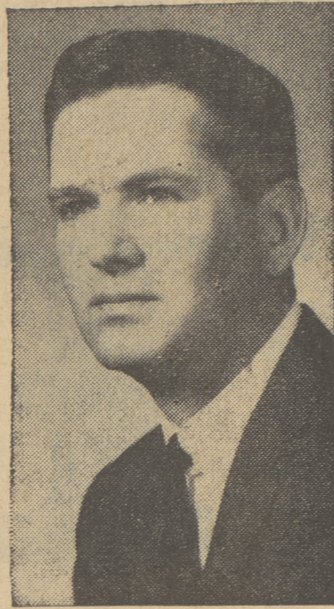
He has been working at the newspaper on a part-time basis since January and has been employed full-time as a general assignment reporter since May.
