Letter carriers will deliver cards to each of the city's 878 residential delivery stops beginning October 10. The cards will have blanks for addresses used most often, but for which individuals do not know the proper ZIP Codes.

The project will be a feature of "ZIP Code Week", October 10-15. Throughout the nation 95,000,000 of the cards will be delivered.

"This is a good time to get the ZIP Codes missing from your lists," Postmaster Buckley noted. "This Christmas, ZIP Code will be as important as shopping and mailing




