FEED-BACK
by Rev. Charles Gilbert
Last Sunday morning Dorothy Gilbert, missionary on furlough from Congo, spoke at the three churches of the Carvorton, Mt. Zion and Orange circuit.
She spoke of the work of the church in three major aspects: 1. The local church at the grass roots; 2. Participation in ecumenical projects; 3. Involvement and witness in the secular world where church members are in school, jobs, and community life.
She spoke on the second aspect first, leaving the consideration of the grass-roots church to the last.
Her most recent ministry was at the medical center at Kimpese where eight participating churches are involved. There are many advantages in this type of work because of larger resources and more conveniences.
She spoke more at length on the work of the grass roots church as it is represented in the church of her first assignment at Wembo Nyama in central Congo. She said in part: "The Local Church can't be a stagnant pool, it must be a spring of living water from which streams must flow out through a thirsty world".
She cited the case of the First African District Superintendent and later to be the first African to be consecrated bishop, Bishop John Wesley Shungu is a product of the African church and now is feeding back into Congo the wealth of his consecration and Christian experience.
She spoke also of Louis T'Uhamba who became so thrilled by an experience of accompanying a missionary on a trip into pygmy country that with glowing face he told Dorothy Gilbert: "Mama, I've got to be a missionary!"
Sure enough, the time came when the Central Congo Conference, using the same commissioning service as was used back in 1951 when Dorothy was commissioned a missionary to Africa Louis T'Uhamba was commissioned by the church to go as a missionary to a large city, Lusamba, in Central Congo.
By these and other incidents which she used the work of Christian "feed-back" into the originating church was dramatically pictured.

Old Presbyterian Meeting-House Invites To Worship For 200 Years

Old churches can be fascinating, particularly to the lovers of early history.
Magnificent edifices can be found anywhere erected by congregations which can afford to erect them but in Alexandria, Virginia, gateway to the South, are two notable places of worship where the very beauty of their simplicity surpasses by far the more modernistic architectural designs.
At Christ Episcopal Church and the Old Presbyterian Meeting House one can truly feel God's presence. I was privileged to visit the latter over the past weekend.
The Old Presbyterian Meeting House, built in 1774 by Scottish pioneers, reflected their desire for full religious freedom. Here worshipped many who were responsible for the birth of the young Republic which has flourished from those roots to shape the destiny of free men.
George Washington, first president of the United States, though not a member of the "Dissenting Church" as it was called, attended meetings here since there were close ties between the Meeting House and the Masonic Order of which he was Worshipful Master.
Many fraternal and historical organizations have shown great interest in the Old Meeting House and it has been called a Masonic Westminister Abbey. Twenty two members of the Masonic Order lie in its small churchyard along with an unknown Revolutionary soldier, Dr. Crake, personal physician who attended Washington during his last illness and many other early patriots.
The enclosed pews over which extends a large balcony faces a plain altar, revealing the simplicity and humility of its parishioners. Along the side walls are niches where stood originally the heating stoves designed to combat the chill of a winter morning.
Until the Civil War split the congregation, colorful, dynamic and patriotic ministers preached from its pulpit. Among the first to serve were Dr. James Muir and Dr. Elias Harrison, both scholars and community leaders, who occupied their charge for three quarters of a century.

Rev. Jones, pastor of Community Bible Church in Sweet Valley, and Back Mountain Community Church in Shavertown, says that reservations are now being taken, and that a number of people in this area have evinced interest.

A shorter tour of fifteen days may be arranged for those who do not wish to take in London and Paris, cities which will be visited on the 22-day program.
Travel will be by jet. It is a complete travel package, including everything except personal expenditures.
Starting time is June 6, 10 p. m., from Kennedy International Airport. A number of variations in travel itineraries are available, but the visit to the Holy Land is the hard kernel of the tour.
Passports and visas are required. For those in the Senior Citizen category, it is advised that applications for passports be made with plenty of time to spare. Birth registration was not made mandatory until 1906, which occasionally makes proof of birth a lengthy process. A baptismal certificate is valid, or an entry in a family Bible.
To obtain maximum benefit from the tour, it is suggested that potential travellers study up on Biblical history, both in the old and the new testaments.

Daughter Of Pioneers To Be Buried Today
Old-timers at the Dallas Post remember that Mrs. Jessie Winters used to send in news of Center Moreland doings, continuing to do so until she was in her eighties.
Mrs. Jessie Schoonover Winters, 91, died on Monday at her home in Center Moreland.
She will be buried this afternoon, in Marsh Cemetery, following services conducted by Rev. Howard Hockenbury from the Center Moreland Methodist Church, where she will lie in state from 1 p. m. until the time set for the funeral at 2 p. m.
Mrs. Winters was daughter of Joseph and Amanda Mosteller Schoonover, the youngest in a family of four girls and two boys. Schoonovers have been prominent in Center Moreland affairs since the days of the pioneers.
Her husband, James W. Winters, who died eighteen years ago, was postmaster at Center Moreland for over forty years, carrying on the government position as part of his general store operation.
Mrs. Schoonover was a member of Center Moreland Methodist Church, where for many years she taught Sunday School, and was active in the women's societies.
Of late, she had not been able to get about so freely. At her home, she enjoyed her African violets and until failing health prevented, crocheting rugs. One of her daughters, Mrs. Leona Thomas, shared her home with her.
She leaves three daughters: Mrs. Thomas and Mrs. Edith Schoonover, Bert Baird, Kingston; eleven grandchildren of Center Moreland; Mrs. Robert children, thirty-two great-grandchildren, and four great-great-grandchildren.
