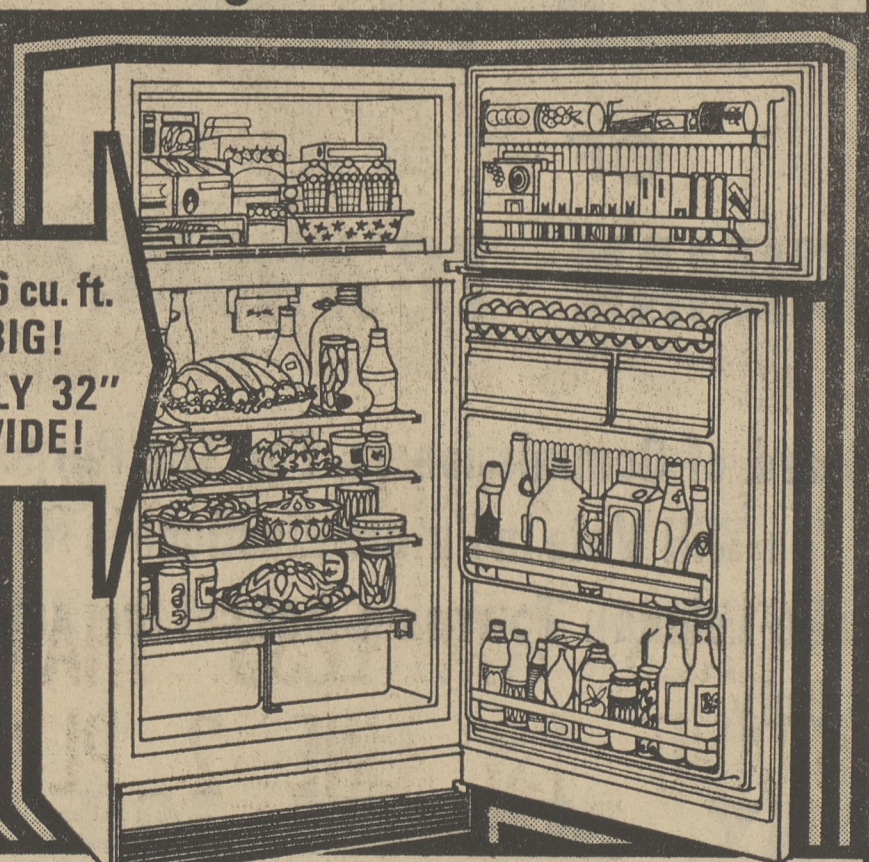
Long Distance Call

Ken and Mary Jane Jenkins couldn't come to Mt. Zion, so her father, Roy J. Thomas spent Easter with them in Toms River, N.J.

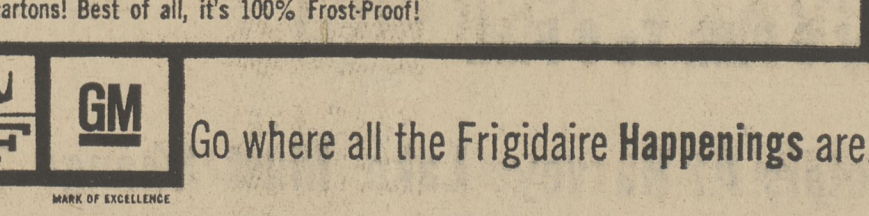

The group has also been given tickets to attend the Shrine Circus on March 29. Each boy must have a permission slip from home in order to attend.

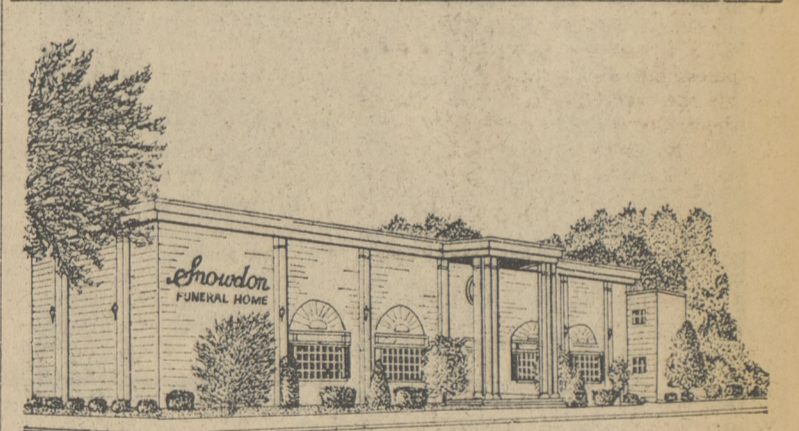
