Fishermen!

James Yoder, Luzerne County Fish Warden, reminds area fishermen that there is a new daily limit for trout caught in Lakes. Formerly, 8 trout could be taken, in a given day - but this year, the limit is 6. "In regard to Harveys Lake," Yoder said, the Silver Salmon that were stocked there some time ago, are classified as a "Trout". A person fishing at Harveys Lake and catching 3 trout and 3 silver salmon on one day, would have his daily limit of 6 trout. Legal size for silver salmon is the same as trout - 6 inches in length. Yoder said that some of the silver salmon in the lake are now 12 to 15 inches.
