Rev. Andrew Derrick, pastor of Glenview and Hudson Primitive Methodist Churches, was officially ordained on Sunday at the Annual Conference of the Primitive Methodist Church held at Blakely.

Rev. Derrick took his stand before the officiating board, the oldest of the group to be ordained.

Sunday was the climax for Rev. Derrick of six years of study in theological subjects required for ordination, study pursued while serving actively as minister.

The conference returned him for another year to ministry of both churches.

In 1957, he started his ministry to the Fernbrook Church, commuting on weekends and prayer meeting nights from Endicot, where he was with the IBM corporation for eighteen and one-half years.

He had a wife and four children when he left the IBM position to embark upon a entirely new field. The children now are grown and married, and Rev. and Mrs. Derrick divide their home-time between the parsonage in Fernbrook and the one in Hudson. Mrs. Derrick is the former Doris Woelkens of Scranton.

His war experience was on a brand new submarine, the Chopper, which swam through the Panama Canal on the eve of the cessation of hostilities with Japan, in the summer of 1945. It was half way across the Pacific when the bomb was dropped in Hiroshima, and the war was over, leaving the torpedoes unfired. The USS Chopper turned and made for Pearl Harbor, where Andrew was discharged.

Andrew had joined the service in 1944, for a tour of duty of nineteen months, spent partially in preparatory schooling in San Diego and New London.

Becoming a minister when beyond the usual age is doing it the hard way, with a family to support, and a lucrative business connection militating against severing connections with a regular pay check and an established niche in a good company.

Rev. Derrick was for nine years listed as a District Supply Minister. In 1966, he became a Conference Supply, which placed him in line for ordination.
