The Fate Of Israel In The Balance

Other churches and other congregations will wish to add their voice to the plea, that Israel must be saved by any diplomatic means possible, short of a shooting war. The President of the United States has no way of knowing what the people want, unless the people speak.

Boy And Pony Killed On Curve
William Naugle III was expecting to ride in the pony section in the Sweet Valley Memorial Day Parade on Tuesday, joining other kindergartners and elementary school children.
The day after Memorial Day, Billy was buried in Our Lady of Mt. Carmel parish cemetery, following an Angel Mass celebrated by Rev. Frank A. Barlik.
Billy, a kindergartner at Lake-Lehman, had ridden his pony back and forth dozens of times between his own home on Route 29, and that of his grandfather, always at the side of the road, never on the pave, travelling according to instructions on the shoulder alongside the guard rail.
It is a sharp curve, not far south of the intersection of route 29 and 118 at Pikes Creek.
