Behind almost every hunting accident is one cause: carelessness. The hunter who blazes away at everything that moves runs a big risk of bagging a fellow hunter.

UPLAND GAME TIPS

"Go slowly" is the pass word of upland hunting. Birds or rabbits will remain hidden in the thick brush until the last possible minute. Check all brush piles, clumps of grass or weeds as you pass and chances are you'll flush whatever game is around.



One of the joys of upland hunting is having a well trained dog along. He can find, flush and retrieve game you might never have seen. And there will be almost no downed or crippled birds or animals left behind.

If you've sharpened your aim and maneuverability with pre-hunting trap and skeel shooting the actual hunt should be easier. For the rapid shooting necessary to bag upland game, experienced hunters choose the lightweight Remington Model 1100 automatic shotgun with 12 gauge plastic shells.
