Striped Or Rock Bass Plentiful This Fall

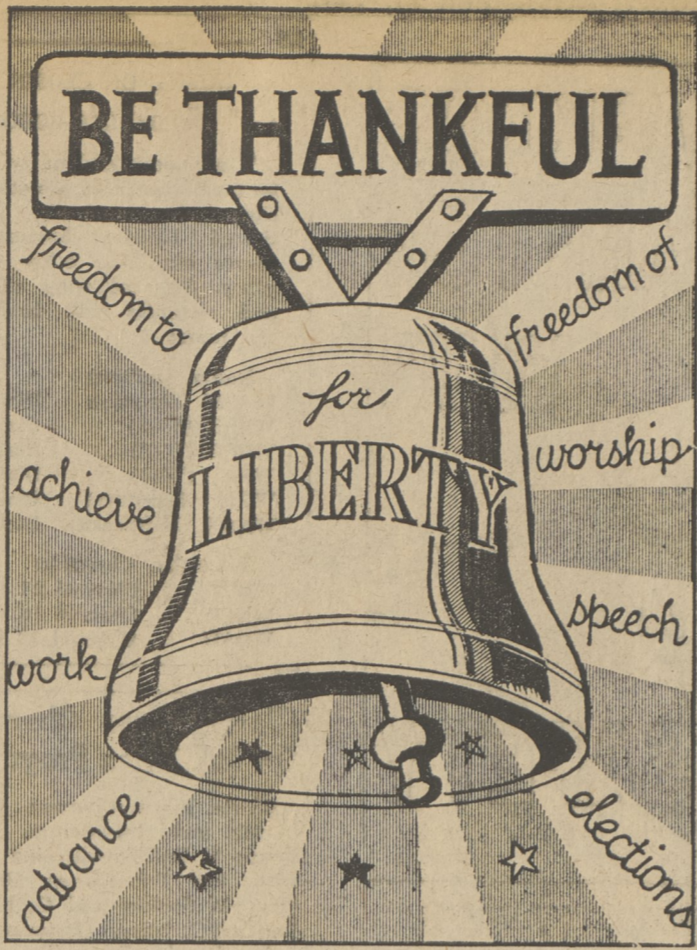
The largest concentration of schools of striped bass in many years is reported in the Delaware River off the mouth of the Pocomoke Creek near the former site of the Pennsylvania Fish Commission's Tomesdale Hatchery. Robert J. Bielo, executive director said fishermen report they are catching the rock or strippers, as they are commonly called, on blood-worms on the outgoing tide.

The spawning areas of this fish on the Atlantic Coast are from New Jersey to North Carolina. Adults migrate from the sea in April and May and so on the bays to brackish or fresh waters of rivers to spawn. In October and November the striped bass return to the deeper waters of bays and the sea.

Female striped bass are mature by the fourth year and males by the third. Quantity of eggs in a 2 pound female is calculated at 14,000 in a 12 pound fish - 1,250,000 and in a 50 pound female as 3,200,000. Survival of eggs and young depend on variations of temperature, salinity, drift, etc.

There is a great fluctuation of abundance in strippers from year to year and place to place, and also great variation of the age group which may dominate the schools in various locations for several years and then disappear.
