

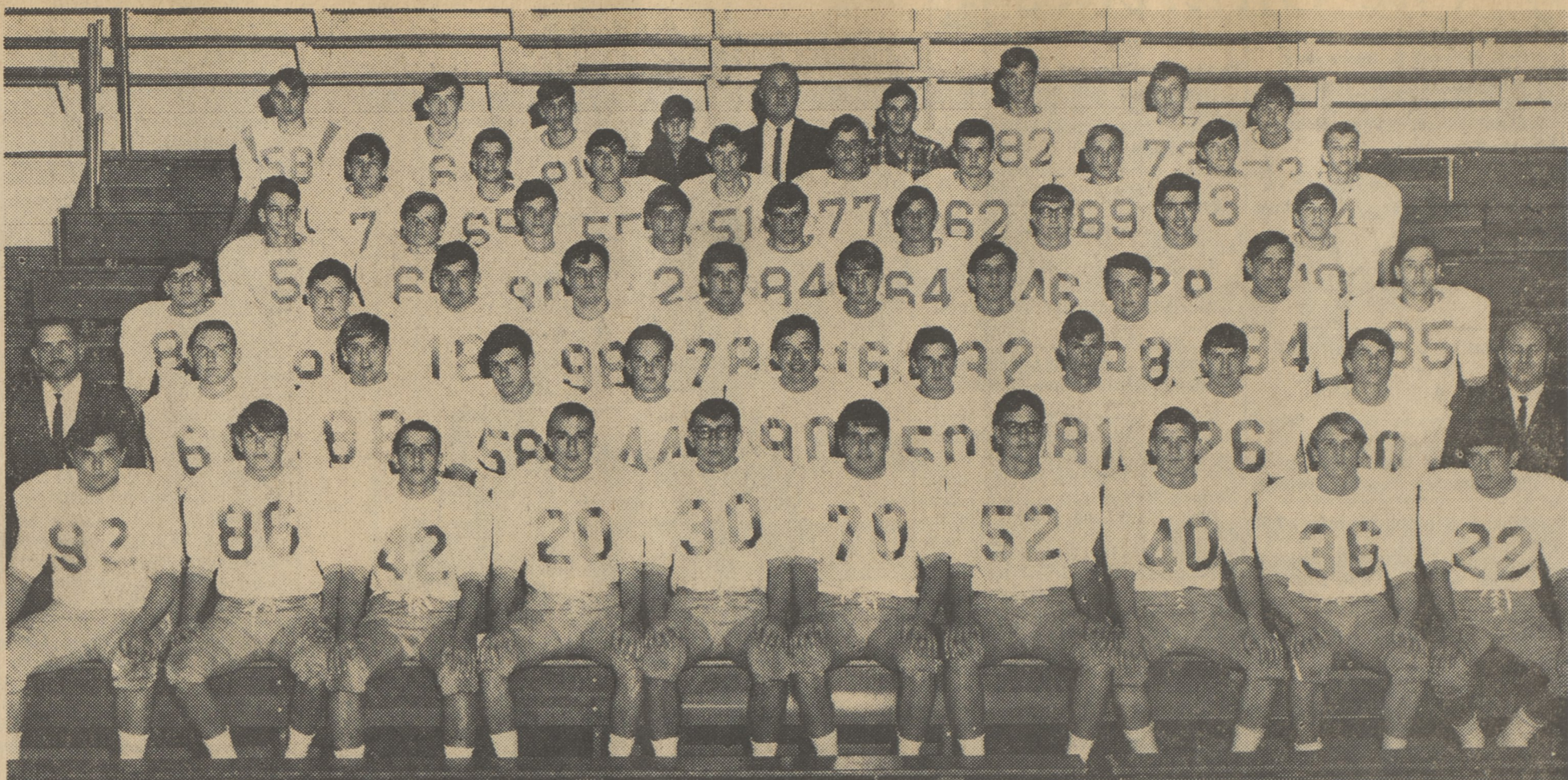

Clarion State Clinic For Wrestling Coaches

It is with great pleasure that the Athletic Department of Clarion State College announces its first annual wrestling clinic for high school coaches. The clinic will be held on the college campus Saturday, November 25, at Harvey Gymnasium. Two sessions, one morning and one afternoon, will be held. The idea of a one-day clinic was conceived by the athletic staff at the request of many high school coaches who expressed an interest in observing techniques, skills, and drills of other coaches.

The areas of major coverage will be decided upon by studying the written responses of those planning to attend the clinic. Clarion's wrestling staff has had thirteen years of high school coaching experience. Head Coach Robert Bubb, a Rex Perry product, coached at Tyrone Area High School; and Assistant Coach Neil Turner, trained by Charles "Doc" Speidel, coached at both Altoona High School and the Thaddeus Stevens Trade School. These men will make every effort to make this a rewarding experience for visiting high school coaches and their staffs. The demonstrations and discussions will cover wrestling techniques, skills, and drills usable by both the beginning and experienced wrestling coach.

FARM-CITY WEEK

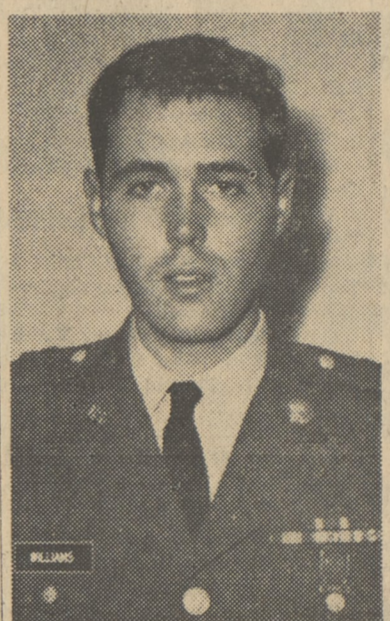
'POSSUM AND SWEET POTATOES

The opossum is a dim-witted, shoe button eyed animal that despite his dull ways has a distinction which few other forms of life on this old planet can claim. He is a living fossil and can trace his ancestry back to the dinosaurs. Perhaps he would not have survived so long if the big bruisers of that ancient age could have sampled baked 'possum with sweet potatoes!

When cleaning opossum, make certain that the glands under the foreleg come away with the skin. Also, discard all excess fat. Young opossums need not be soaked in salt water beyond a 15 to 30 minute period to draw the blood. With fully matured animals, a 6 hour period is sufficient.
Stuff the 'possum with your favorite bread or sage dressing, brush with butter and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 2 hours. Baste every 20 minutes with butter. Place canned sweet potatoes around the 'possum, sprinkle both the meat and potatoes heavily with brown sugar and bake 30 minutes longer.
