Rev. Banick Sees Bright Future For Area Ecumenical Movement

Rev. Thomas Banick, assistant Pastor at Gate of Heaven Roman Catholic Church, delivered the final address of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, speaking Thursday evening from the pulpit of Trinity United Presbyterian Church.

Limitation of space forbids printing of his entire talk, but those who heard what he had to say were deeply impressed with his forward looking approach to the subject of Ecumenism. They particularly liked his concluding remarks: "Let us build for the future. We must look forward and start to build the Holy City."

Father Banick said, in part: Cardinal Bea, head of the Vatican Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity, pinpoints the obstacles to Christian Unity with these words: "The obstacles which stand in the way of re-establishment of full Communion are many and varied. Some of them are found at the level of the profession of faith, that is, in the expression of faith, and not necessarily at the level of faith itself. Others are of a more practical kind. It is easy to affirm the existence of these obstacles, but it is difficult to evaluate their weight, as they are inseparable from obstacles of a psychological order which seem to be most important."

Different mentalities... have become slowly strangers to each other. We do not understand one another any longer. We have ceased to feel as brothers and to treat one another as brothers. We have let charity grow cold. We have hardened in opposition to each other. We have underlined and increased the differences. We have become enured. For centuries this attitude has helped to create the mentality of Christians in regard to one another.

My dear fellow Christians, it is for us to seek to reform what the centuries have deformed in our relationship to each other as Christians. All of us here tonight would agree, I think, with Cardinal Bea's analysis of the unfortunate role that our respective Catholic and Protestant histories have played in developing our attitudes towards one another, as well as how these attitudes have crystallized into positions and theological positions. Yet, it is one thing to see a situation clearly, it is quite another thing to want to do something about it.

Your presence here tonight at the final service of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity betrays your willingness to do something about it.

You are a living proof that post-Vatican II Ecumenism is adding a new dimension; it is becoming grass roots, non-specialized, parochial, it is moving from the drawing board discussions of church leaders and professional theologians into the daily experience of the parish priest and minister, and laypeople.

And so we find that Ecumenism is a prayer service conducted by Pope Paul and the Protestant observers at the Second Vatican Council and of Catholic observers at the Uppsala Assembly of the World Council of Churches, but it is also the presence of Protestants in Catholic homes and Catholics in Protestant homes sharing "Living Room Dialogues" together.

Ecumenism is the common concern of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and the National Council of Churches for racial justice and civil harmony in the U. S., but it is also the common witness of the Christian Churches of our community in their efforts to promote social justice, poverty programs, job opportunities, and open housing in the Back Mountain Area.

Ecumenism is when a Presbyterian can say: "Hello Father Banick" and mean it; and when a Catholic can say "Hello, Rev. Mr. Pillarella" and mean it.

This is Ecumenism: the big things that make headlines, but also the little things that are noticed only by a sensitively ecumenical Christian, and which really are more important because they affect people in their everyday, interpersonal relationships. I mention them merely to propose an existential definition for this thing we call Ecumenism, nor so much to illustrate the need for parallel ecumenical efforts at high and low levels, but mostly to convince you tonight as we end these services, that doors are opening and walls of division are crumbling; to convince you that steps towards Christian unity, even though small and sometimes rather halted, have been taken at all levels of Christian life; to convince you, in the words of Bishop Wright of Pittsburgh who recently addressed the Elm Park Methodist Church Mid Winter Institute, A Seed of Unity is sprouting, indicating that the long, hard winter of Christian disunity is over and springtime is ahead.
