Methodists And United Brethren Complete Proposed Unification
For years it was the Methodist Episcopal Church, known commonly as the M. E. Church.
Methodists, south and north, were separate entities.
Over the course of the years, the Episcopal was dropped from the name, and it became the Methodist Church.
At the spring conferences in Methodist Churches throughout the Nation, a vote was taken to unite with the United Brethren. The vote was overwhelmingly in favor of the move, with very few dissenting voices.
The United Brethren also voted on union with the Methodist Church, and again by a very large majority.
This week, Methodists and United Brethren have completed the transition from two church organizations to one large denomination, Methodist United Church.
Over eleven million members make it the largest Protestant denomination in the world.
For many years, the Methodist Church was practically the only church in the Back Mountain, though the Church of Christ was solidly entrenched.
The other denominations came later.
With a Methodist church in practically every hamlet of the Back Mountain, the Methodists still predominate in this area.

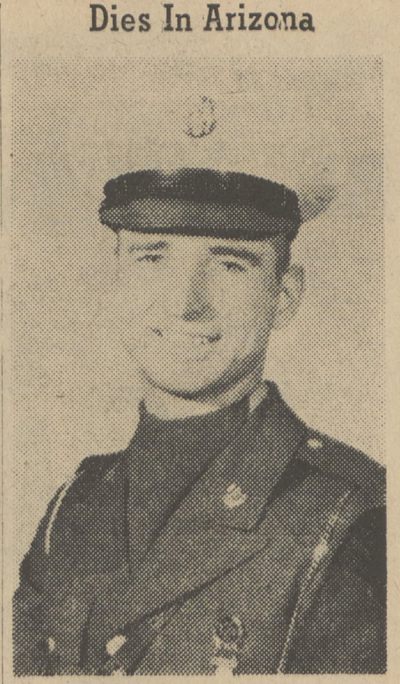

LAWRENCE ERNEST RACE

Last week the Dallas Post printed an obituary on Lawrence Ernest Race.
This week, the family has provided a picture of the 27-year-old boy who died at the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Prescott, Arizona, and has written the following article:
"Lawrence Ernest Race Jr., 27, died April 13, 1968, at Wipple VA Hospital, Prescott, Arizona.
