Nancy's Letters Continue From The Mission Field In West Africa

Along with the baking, helping with the grades etc., I am teaching James our houseboy to type and George Tehmch, the boy who is working in the office, bookkeeping. There are also the small visitors, Andrew is the most frequent one.
While on a trip to Monrovia, we went to visit Glenn Woodeschick, a Peace Corps boy from Askam. It was good to talk with someone from home. The trip takes almost six hours and is quite tiring since the road is not paved until we reach Totota, three hours from here.
In January, we attended a wedding of two missionaries in otona. The bride had a beautiful white gown, which one of the missionaries made and the two attendants wore deep rose-colored gowns with flowers the exact color from the bushes here. The reception was held on the lawn of their new home and we had rice and goat soup for themeal. It was quite tasty.
The school received four hundred baby chicks. They came by air from Holland. Many were near exhaustion when they arrived. We revived most of them. Some of the workmen, George and I spent much time giving them water. We also have four cows on campus.
We had a lovely ham dinner at the principal Kwelwe's house; everyone took something. I made the fruit salad. The nine oranges I used were 2c apiece (I used 7). The oranges were 2c apiece also. The grapefruit and bananas were given to me and I had a few maraschino cherries which added color. There were twenty five of us there.
A holiday, no school. It was J.J. Roberts' birthday. He was the first president of Liberia. In the afternoon the students played volleyball - the new students against the old students. We enjoy watching them.
We visited with Dr. Pederson (the Board secretary from New York), Pastor Payne, and Pastor Currons. Dr. Pederson is visiting the stations. On Saturday morning the three of them ate breakfast with us. In the afternoon the staff, and missionaries from Zorzor and National Church workers from the area met with Dr. Pederson. He gave an inspiring talk.
Pastor Henry Dugulu from Zorzor ate with us on Saturday night and also spent the night here. He is the man in the film "Quest" which we saw about Liberia before coming here. He was guest Pastor at Lutheran Training Institute on Greater Shavertown. After dinner we drove him home to Zorzor. Then George and I went to Salaya to teach Sunday School.
It is both a happy and sad time for us now. We are anxious to get home but sorry to be leaving a home and friends who have become very dear to us. One of our younger friends Angelina, when we told her that we would be leaving said, "We will not see you again here. When we die and go to God, then we will see you again." It was very touching.
James, our houseboy says he cannot believe we are really leaving. It must be a dream. He is with us every day and has become like one of the family. The people are sad when they come and see us packing. Belema, the night watchman, who visited us every night is especially sad. Last night he said, I suffer too much; I go to have small cry." 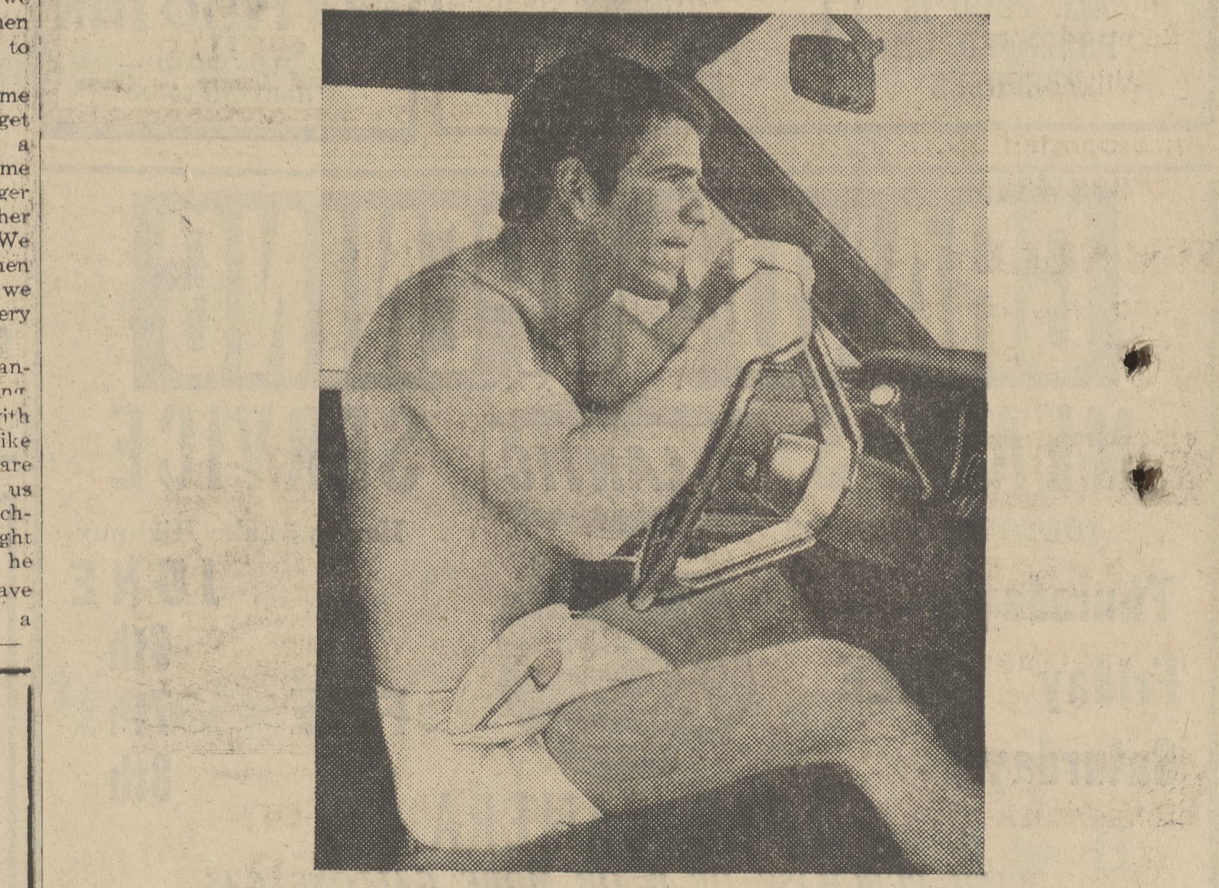
