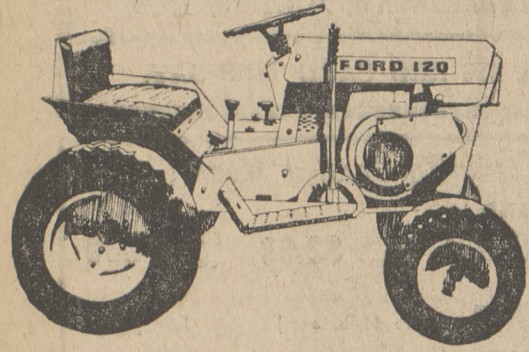


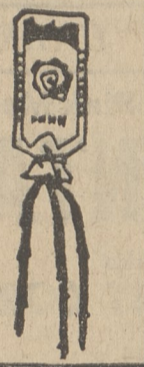

Penn's Woods Scouts Open Camping Season

Penn's Woods Girl Scout Council will hold ceremonies on Saturday, June 29, to dedicate the new dock and swimming area at Camp Wildwood, Harveys Lake. The ceremony will begin at 3:30 p.m. Charles F. Hensley, principal of Coughlin High School and long-time friend of Girl Scouting, will give the dedicatory address.

The program will feature the Penn's Woods "Piper", Mrs. Emil Hovanitz, Kingston, and her "Piper Pals". The Junior Troop 806, Mountaintop and Troop 705, Tracksville, will do the opening and closing ceremonies.

The total cost of the new dock was \$14,000, representing 56,000 boxes of cookies purchased by the public from Girl Scouts of Penn's Woods. The public is invited to attend the ceremonies.

The summer camping program will begin the second week in July. The first session at Camp Wildwood, Harveys Lake, and Camp Ideal, between Numidia and Catawissa, will be July 8; Camp Joy Lo, Hobbie, starts on July 22. Second sessions will be held at Camp Wildwood on July 22 and at Camp Joy Lo on August 5.

At Summer Institute

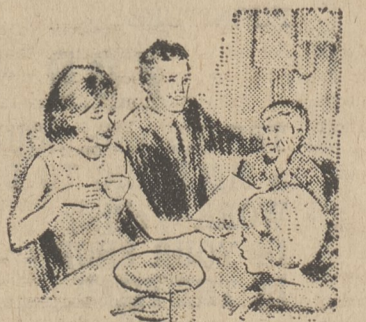
