St. Paul's Calls Pastor To Pulpit
After a considerable period of time, St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Shavertown has formally called a new pastor to head the congregation.
Rev. William C. Bispels and his family moved into the parsonage last week. He will take the pulpit formally on Sunday. He has conducted services for the past two Sundays in advance of his installation as pastor.
Rev. Bispels is one of a growing body of ministers who have embraced the ministry after a considerable experience in other fields, either business or professional. He has only recently been ordained.
A native of Philadelphia, he graduated from Girard College in 1953, from Temple University in 1955, and from Philadelphia Seminary of the Lutheran Church in 1958.
While a student in theological seminary he was director of evangelism and director of youth at St. Paul's Church in Philadelphia, also assistant pastor of St. Shulbin, and chaplain at Hickory Run State Park.
He is a married man, with two young children, Bill, 9, and Judy, 7. After the 10 a.m. worship service on Sunday, July 7, there will be a reception in the church social rooms for the new pastor and his family.

Catholic Program Gets Large Gift
The Diocese of Scranton's Project: Expansion program received its largest single gift of the campaign last Monday when the Pennsylvania Gas and Water Company pledged \$75,000. The gift was made to the Most Reverend J. Carroll McCormick, D.D., Bishop of Scranton by Mr. Rulison Evans, Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer and Mr. Robert R. Evans, President of the utility. In making the presentation Mr. Rulison Evans stated "we are pleased as a corporate citizen to support this most worthy project."
With the receipt of this latest gift the campaign for the Diocese of Scranton passed the \$12 million figure and reached to over 150% of its originally designated \$8 million goal. The program is currently organizing a continuation program in the parishes of the Diocese and seeking major gifts from business and industry of the eleven county area of northeastern Pennsylvania.
The program was initiated to finance construction costs of a number of facilities to be built over a 10 year period at an estimated cost of approximately \$15 million.

Lake And Noxen Lutheran Churches Start Leisure-Recreation Program

Vacationers and residents in the Harveys Lake area are invited to attend an inter-faith dialogue, to be held on Wednesday evening, July 3, at the Sandy Beach Pavilion, beginning at 8 p.m. Father Thomas Flynn, assistant pastor at Gate of Heaven Roman Catholic Church, Dallas, and Pastor Daniel Eckert, pastor of Christ Lutheran Church, Wilkes-Barre, will discuss some of the basic principles and issues involved in the ecumenical relationship between protestants and catholics. The audience will be invited to ask questions and to participate in the discussion.

Both Father Flynn and Pastor Eckert are well qualified to lead in such a dialogue by virtue of their present involvement in the ecumenical movement. Father Flynn has been appointed by his Bishop to the diocesan Commission on Ecumenical and Human Affairs, and serves as secretary to that group. He has been a participant in similar dialogues in recent years. Pastor Eckert taught a course this past year on protestant theology at Kings Roman Catholic College. He is also the newly elected president of the Wyoming Valley Council of Churches.
"This is the first of many events," said Mr. Calvin McHose, "which are being conducted for vacationers and residents in the lake area." Mr. McHose is a member of Reformation Lutheran Church at the Lake, which is sponsoring a ministry to vacationers jointly with St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Noxen. "We invite members and friends of all denominations and beliefs to attend this inter-faith dialogue," said Mr. McHose.

Film Series
A unique and interesting film series, sponsored by the Lutheran Churches at Harveys Lake and Noxen, has been announced by the planning committee. The film series, open to vacationers and residents in the Lake area, will be held every Monday evening beginning Monday, July 8, 8:30 p.m. at the Sand Beach Pavilion. Primarily selected for adults and senior youth, the films focus on a particular situation or incident in life with which the audience easily identifies itself. "People don't just watch these films," said Pastor George Scheitlin, "they become involved in them and want to talk to others about them." A discussion period will follow the showing of each film.

"The Hand" will be shown July 8. In color, nineteen minutes long, written and directed by Jiri Trnka in Czechoslovakia, "The Hand" is an allegory with two symbols, a man and a Hand, with the Hand representing a force which compels each individual to do what he does not wish to do. Dear Family:

An old man came in with an intestinal obstruction. He had been treated elsewhere for 3 months and finally shut off completely last week. We gave him Wangersteen suction, I.V. fluids and tried to get Dr. Hughtlet on the radio but he was in Kinshasa to a big mission meeting. We went ahead and did a temporary colostomy. Olga Victor is still our surgeon with me kibitzing — as though I knew something about it! We got together and studied the surgery books beforehand. Victor smelled Chenopodium Oil and asked the patient if he had taken worm medicine, and sure enough, somebody elsewhere had given the poor guy with his abdominal obstruction the most powerful and dangerous worm medicine there is, which we haven't used since the invention of Piperazine. The man feels 1000% better, is up and eating and I just hope the antibiotics we are loading him with will keep the infection away. Of course he still has some kind of rectal mass which some visiting surgeon has to remove. One is coming in March for two weeks.
