"Viewpoint," College Misericordia Faculty Speakers' Bureau, will be in operation by Nov. 15, according to an announcement today by directors of the new organization.

Edward F. Hanlon, Ph.D., and Sr. Mary Paul Paye, R.S.M., Ph.D., are directors of the Bureau. It is designed, they said, to provide a service in the area, "from college to community."

Speakers for meetings, banquets and other occasions are in frequent demand in the area, the directors noted. This demand was brought to their attention by increased calls upon the faculty to provide such a service.

Viewpoint will make available to clubs and other organizations a panel of specialists in a number of different fields.

It has been under discussion at College Misericordia since the beginning of the fall term. Eight faculty members are now in the group.

The directors added that all are well known locally for their activities as public speakers, and that a number have spoken extensively in out-of-state communities.

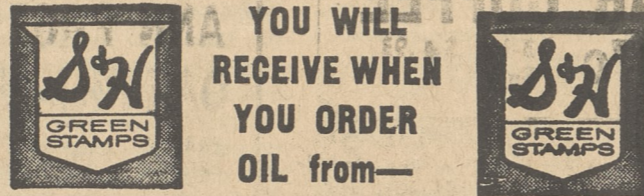
The association hopes to see passage of Senate Bill 1414 which calls for compulsory
