"One hundred million more Americans will be added to our present population count in the next thirty years.

"Pennsylvania's natural resources will be needed to help feed, house and clothe the coming generation," said R. M. Davis, head of USDA Soil Conservation Service operations in Pennsylvania, with headquarters in Harrisburg.

Referring to National Farm-City Week, Nov. 22-28, Mr. Davis said: "This annual observance helps remind us how urgently we need to plan the uses of our countryside, town and city areas."

He suggested that Farm-City Week events might include joint efforts by farm organizations, civic and business groups, youth and women's clubs.

Orderly development of Pennsylvania's urban open spaces, pollution control, flood prevention, rural recreation and nature areas, highway beautification and wildlife protection were listed.
