

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But Mr. Nixon didn't stop there. The question of a Presidential Debate was being discussed during the campaign, and he handled that issue miserably. His public stance was that he would be glad to debate Hubert Humphrey, but that he would keep his hands off while Congress debated the bill that would make such a confrontation possible. All the while, his aides were sending word to Capitol Hill; knock that proposal down.

Thousands of students, as well as thousands of people over 30, had worked hard through the spring and summer to enliven the democratic process, and Mr. Nixon came along and did his best to suffocate it.

Lyndon Johnson ran a fairly clean campaign in 1964, as did John Kennedy in 1960, and Dwight Eisenhower was pretty decent, too, if you could forgive his running mate.

But the Nixon run for the money in 1968 left a sour taste in the mouth, and now that

inauguration week has come, we find students resigned to a fate, not caring to talk about it, neither excited nor alarmed, but looking forward to four years under a humorless man who will neither turn clocks forward nor set them back, but just let things drift, four years of a Gray Society.
