rummage sale

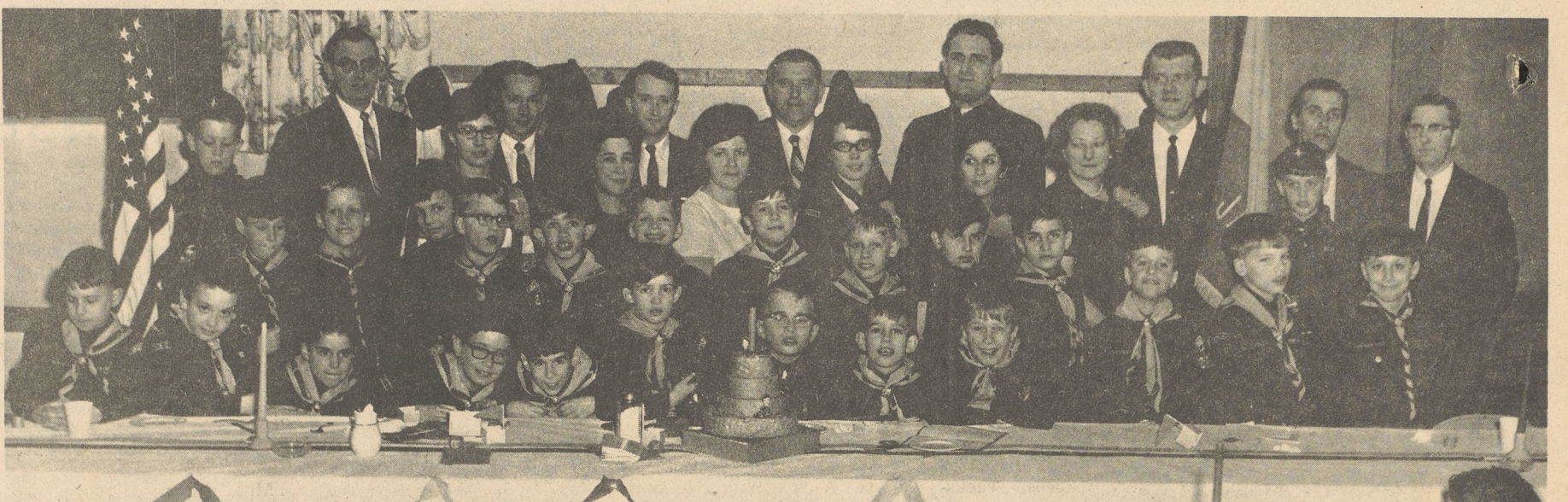

frozen foods

Check the condition of the freezer cabinet when buying frozen foods at the store, suggests Harold Neigh, Penn State extension consumer economics specialist. Cabinet should be clean, free of ice, and packages not stacked above the "fill" line. Temperature of the cabinet should be zero degrees or below. Pennsylvania's frozen food code requires that retailers adhere to these two requirements.
