Dallas Education Association will be installed by Mr. Davies.

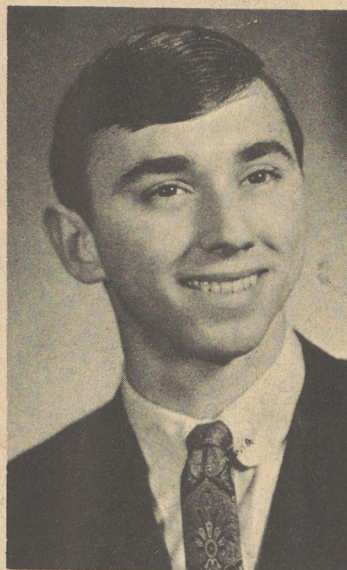

Entertainment will be provided by the "Jesters," a boys' barber-shop ensemble from the Senior High School.

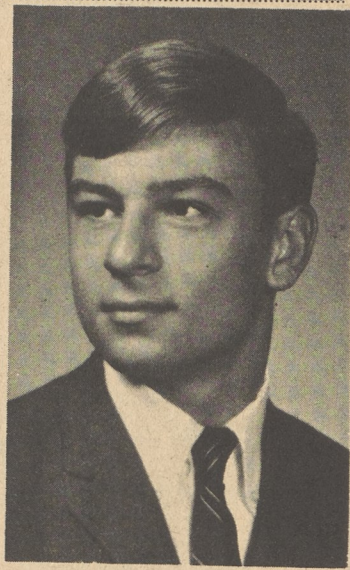
Gifts and corsages will be presented to the retiring teachers; gifts will also be presented to those newly married and to resigning teachers with years of service.

win drama awards

The Back Mountain area is well represented theatrically at Bloomsburg State College where two young men have been devoting their talents to the Bloomsburg Players, the college's dramatic organization. Both young men were honored at the Players' annual banquet last Friday evening at the Hotel Magee in Bloomsburg.

Sam Hopkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Zachary, Shavertown, was elected by the organization to serve as its president for the 1969-70 school year. The election results were announced by retiring president Bruce Hopkins, West Dallas, who has held the position for two years.

Sam is a graduate of Dallas High School and is in his sophomore year at the college, where he is enrolled in the division of Secondary Education, with a major in Public Speaking and Theatre Arts. He joined the drama organization during his Freshman year and devoted his talents to the production angle of all four of the Players' dramatic offerings that year.

During the summer of 1968 the two young men were roommates when they participated in the Summer Theatre '68 program at the college. Sam undertook the highly involved job of stage manager for 'The Glass Menagerie,' which starred a pretty, well-known actress—Academy Award winner Mercedes McCambridge.

Not wanting to remain behind the scenes, Mr. Zachary had ample opportunity to prove his acting ability this season, receiving substantial roles in three of the college's four major productions: A STREET-CAR NAMED DESIRE, HENRY IV, and MY SISTER EILEEN.

He was further honored in October by being granted mem-

bership in the Alpha Omicron cast of Alpha Psi Omega, the National Honorary Fraternity for Dramatics.

In retiring as President of the theatrical organization, Mr. Hopkins congratulated the members and faculty for the outstanding contribution they are making toward the betterment of theatre, as well as of BSC. He also thanked them for having given him the opportunity to serve as their president.

Bruce became active in the Bloomsburg Players during his Freshman year, and has aided in the production of some 20 plays since that time. He has received roles in 10 of the college's dramatic offerings. During his Sophomore year, he too was elected to membership in Alpha Psi Omega, and also served as Treasurer of the Players. The following summer, he acted as understudy to Broadway actor Robert Salvio, who was appearing at the college in NIGHT MUST FALL.

A graduate of Dallas Senior High School, Mr. Hopkins received his B.S. Degree in Secondary Education, Speech and Theatre Arts, from BSC in January of this year. Since then, he has been doing some graduate work at the college.

The readers of the Dallas Post are familiar with this young man through his column, OFF THE CUFF STUFF. In addition, Bruce is a contributing writer to PULSE, a new Wyoming Valley monthly magazine which will begin publication in June.

Mr. Hopkins has recently been accepted for summer study at the Neighborhood Playhouse School of Drama in New York City. In the fall he will be Director of Dramatics at Central Bucks County High School in Doylestown, Pa.

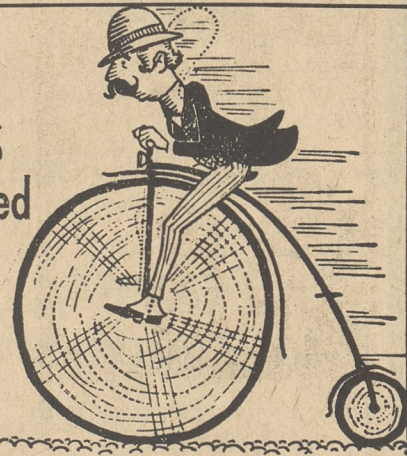
