

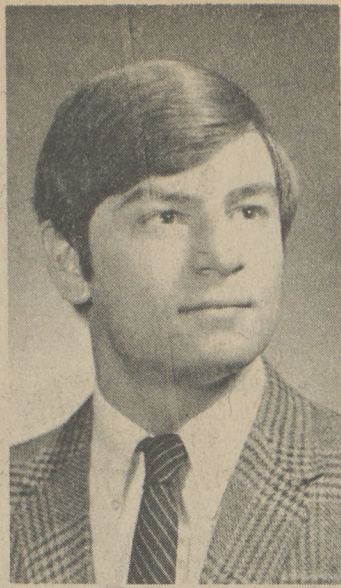
# Samuel Zachary in "Who's Who"

# 2 area residents play key roles in Oratorio Society

Two Back Mountain residents play key roles in the December presentation of the Wyoming Valley Oratorio Society at Irem Temple in Wilkes-Barre. Ruth Turn Reynolds of Trucksville, is president of the Society and a member of the chorus, while Clifford E. Balshaw, New Goss Manor, Dallas, is director of the Oratorio Society. The 23rd fall concert, Dec. 6 according to Mrs. Reynolds, will feature the works of Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827), to join in the world-wide celebration of the great German composer's bi-centenary year.

Director Balshaw has selected for the concert Beethoven's "Calm Sea and Prosperous Voyage" and "Christ on the

Mount of Olives." Also, to be presented is Ralph Vaughn Williams' "Flos Campi"—Flowers of the Field.

Mrs. Reynolds is well known throughout the region, both as a soloist and as an instructor of voice, piano and organ. She studied music at Julliard School of Music in New York City and at Wilkes College. In addition to her teaching career, she is organist and choir director at Trucksville Methodist Church, director and counselor of the Junior Mozart Chorale in Wilkes-Barre. She is a former president of the Senior Mozart Club and former dean of the American Guild of Organists, Wilkes-Barre Chapter.

Mr. Balshaw has conducted

the Wyoming Valley Oratorio Society since 1952. He is a faculty member and organ instructor at Wilkes College; faculty member and instructor of organ and voice at College Misericordia where he conducts the Madrigal Singers. He is choir master and organist for St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Wilkes-Barre and director of music at Temple B'nai B'rith, Kingston. His wife, Dorothy, is soprano soloist at Temple B'nai B'rith and St. Stephens.

Director Balshaw said the fall concert will be accompanied by full orchestra which will feature Eugene Brandstadter, prominent Wilkes-Barre violinist. Featured vocal soloists will be Joseph W. Geyer, tenor, of Litchfield, Connecticut, and Joanne Netter Heron, Wilkes-Barre.

Tickets for the concert are now on sale at area music, card and book stores, at St. Stephen's Church House in Wilkes-Barre, and from all members of the board and chorus of the Oratorio Society. Tickets will also be available at the box office the day of the concert Dec. 6.

## superior wines can be produced by hobbyists

Serving a flavorful, colorful wine is one of the most pleasurable moments that can be experienced by the wine hobbyist.

Excellent wines can be made by the amateur. In fact, many home-produced wines often are superior to commercial products, according to a new book, "Winemaking as a Hobby," published by The Pennsylvania State University College of Agriculture.

"The hit and miss methods of wine production employed by our ancestors need not be used today," reports James H. Eakin and Donald L. Ace, Penn State Cooperative Extension Service specialists, co-authors of the book. "We can take advantage of great advancements in winemaking technology."

Ideal as a Christmas gift, the publication gives detailed information on the various procedures the hobbyists should follow in obtaining an excellent product. Included are numerous illustrations and photographs. Topics covered include grape species and varieties, wine types, equipment and chemicals, making wines, bottling, storing and aging, making fruit wines, chemical testing, and rules for serving. A special section is devoted to the amateur who is interested in the process of winemaking by recipe.

## antique keys unit's design

Antique keys are "in" these days and many people proudly display old family treasures in their home decor.

Those not lucky enough to inherit fine old furniture haunt antique shops or second-hand and junk stores, even flea markets depending on their resources.

For a family hand-me-down or an old cabinet you've found and returned, a built-in display unit will give it prominence and protection.

Shelves display smaller items, and cabinets below provide storage, fitted with locks if desired.

Adding to the unit's usefulness is a wet bar for entertaining. If the unit is to be placed in a large entry area instead of a family or living room, the wet bar can be replaced with storage for umbrellas, overshoes and coats.

The display unit is constructed of 1x10- or 1x12-inch western fir or pine boards. Doors are 1x4-inch tongue-and-groove paneling, which also may be used to face the inset area.

The paneling may be stained or left natural, depending on color or finish of the antique furniture.
