Me: Huber was not injured in the 6:45 p.m. mishap. His 1967 Buick was damaged approximately \$200.


Route 309, at the intersection with Harris Hill Road, was the scene of a rear-collision July 17 at 6:20 p.m.

The building, with two levels, will have an organic chemistry laboratory with preparation room and four special study areas; a physics laboratory with a preparation room and dark room; and a biology laboratory, also with a preparation area, sterile room, and






