

Shavertown Man to Exhibit Over 40 Paintings, Sketches

Diversity and quality are the key concepts in the art exhibit of Jay Borton, Shavertown, to be held Sept. 9, 10, and 11, in the Hayfield Ballroom of the Penn State University, Wilkes-Barre Campus, Lehman.

This is the second consecutive year that Mr. Borton, Wilkes-Barre Campus Alumnus, has held a one-man art exhibit on the local campus. In September 1970, he exhibited 42 works completed by him.

This year's exhibit will include more than 40 paintings and sketches executed by Mr. Borton since last September. His works will include pen and ink, acrylic canvas, scratchboards, miniature paintings, paperfold and relief wall-hangings. Many of them will be

for sale to those desiring an original work in abstract, modern, or contemporary design.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James J. Borton, 62 Yeager Ave. Shavertown, and received his associate degree in drafting and design from the local campus. He is presently attending University Park where he is pursuing his baccalaureate degree in Penn State's fine arts curriculum.

Jay graduated from Central Catholic High School, Kingston, where he was art director of theatrical productions, art advisor for the newspaper and designer of the *Masthead*. He also served as art editor of *Speculum* school magazine, and of the yearbook.

He has won numerous awards for his artwork including second prize in the Hallmark Contest, 1963; Senior award for "Excellence in the field of art, 1968; first prize in an art contest sponsored by PSU, Wilkes-Barre Campus, March, 1969; and 1st prize award in the Banner Contest at "All University Day" at Penn State University.

While a student at the local campus, he designed the *Masthead* for the PSU newspaper, designed and constructed two 3 feet by 6 feet chandeliers for Hayfield Ballroom at the Wilkes-Barre Campus, designed and painted the banner which won him first place award and completed numerous paintings, one of which hangs on the wall in the dean of student affairs' office at the local campus.

In June 1970, he gained recognition as the recipient of "Who's Who in American Junior Colleges." He is also a member of Wyoming Valley Art League.

In addition to his Wilkes-Barre Campus exhibits, Mr. Borton held an exhibit in July 1967—a one-man exhibit in the United Penn Bank, an Independence Day exhibit depicting the most famous naval vessels in the U.S. Navy. In June 1969 he took part in a three-man exhibit at the Wilkes-Barre Campus during Fete Champetre Weekend.

This year's exhibit will be open to the general public Sept. 9 and 10 from 7-10 p.m.; Sept. 11, 1-4 p.m. and 7-10 p.m.

Mrs. Jacob Harris and children, Cynthia, Jacob Jr., and David, Cliffside Avenue, were confined to their home last week by illness.

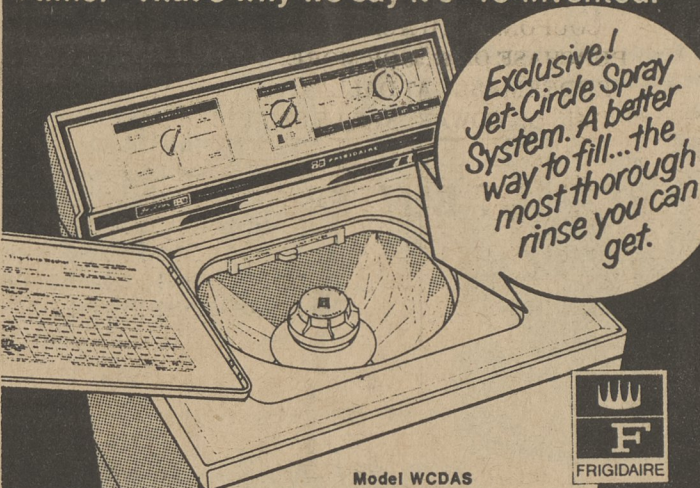

Beatrice L. Williams, Hill Street, celebrated her birthday Friday. She was honor guest at a family dinner Sunday.

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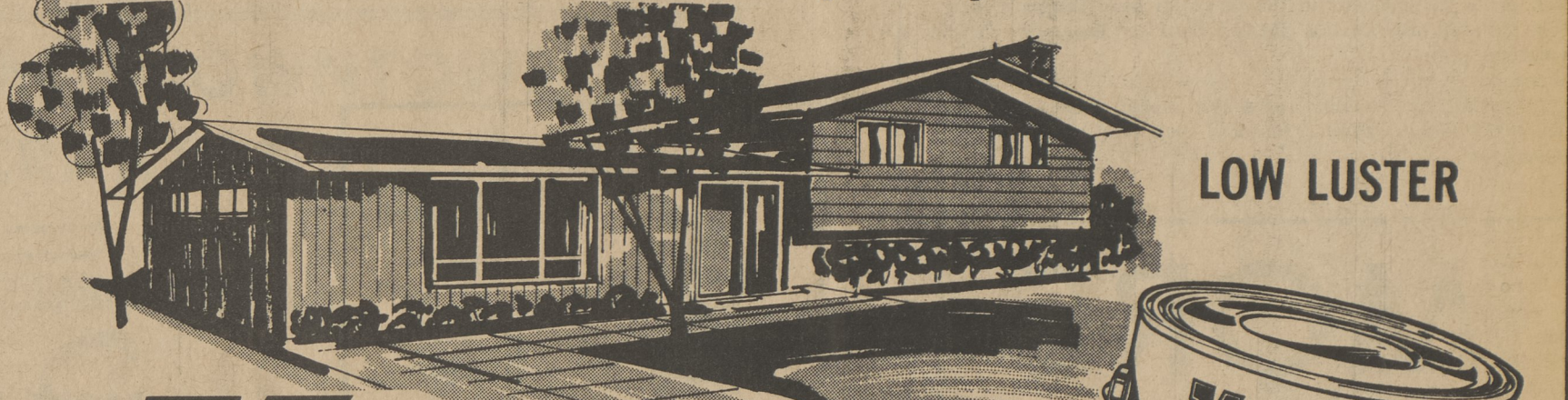
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
