Kitchen-Avoid overloading electrical circuits. Since increasing usage of appliances requires up-to-date electrical outlets, have an expert inspect your wiring if you live in an older home.

Keep curtains, towel racks and waste containers at a safe distance from the stove.

Wipe up grease spills immediately—they are highly flammable. Always detach the cord from the electrical outlet when finished using an ap- Photo by J. Kozemchak Sr. pliance. Check for combustible warnings on labels of household cleaners, and keep them away from the stove or heaters.

Bedroom-Never smoke in bed. Don't hang paper posters, fishing nets or other flammable decorator items over the bed or doorways where they can create a fiery trap. Keep closets and other out-of-the-way places free from rubbish.

Attic-Throw out stacks of old newspapers, outgrown clothing and other "treasures" that have Yellow Car accumulated over the years.

Basement and utility area-Keep trash in covered metal cans. Have the furnace cleaned and checked regularly by professionals. Don't overload workshop machinery. Use only explosion-proof electrical equipment when working near flammable liquid vapors or dusts. Keep work area uncluttered.

Garage-Store paints, varnish and flammable liquids in tightly closed metal containers-never glass-and keep only small amounts of gasoline and kerosene on hand.


