Over 60% C.M. Students Receive Financial Aid

College Misericordia has released figures indicating that over 60 percent of its student body receives some form of financial aid while attending the College.

According to materials published in connection with the College's Golden Jubilee Capital Funds Campaign, Misericordia indicates that students receive in excess of \$725,000 annually in financial aid funds. Of

the amount, more than \$180,000 comes from Misericordia's own operating income.

Part of the financial aid supplied from Misericordia's own money is in the form of academic scholarships. The College is one of the few remaining in the country that still rewards academic excellence in high school by awarding college scholarships.

Financial aid for students is one of the three areas for which funds are being sought in the College's Golden Jubilee Campaign. The College is seeking \$2 million to be used as an endow-

ment for student financial aid. The funds will enable the College to aid even greater numbers of students to achieve a Misericordia education.

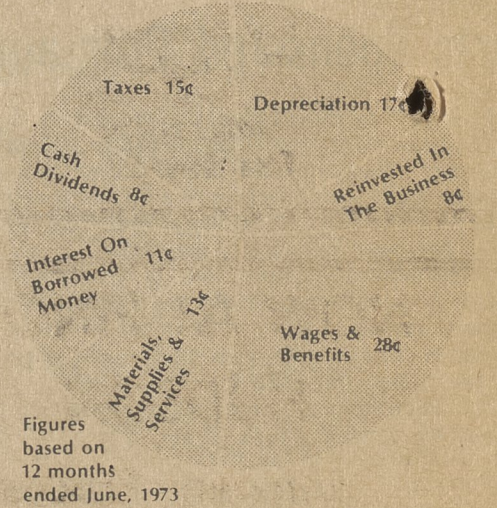
