with Erhard Koller, the Kingston prep school's German instructor and faculty advisor to the German Club.

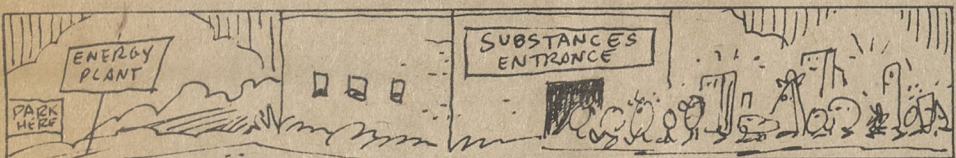
One Sem student was a bit more at home in Yorkville than the rest. She was Diethild Becker, an "exchange student" from Muhlstrabe, West Germany.
