King's-Temple Agreement Aids Pre-Dental Majors

King's College of Wilkes-Barre and the Temple University School of Dentistry in Philadelphia have concluded an agreement by which qualified pre-dental majors at King's may apply for early admission to the Temple School of Dentistry by meeting certain conditions.

Students who transfer from King's to Temple under the agreement may apply to King's for their bachelor of science degree in biology on completion of two semesters of full-time study, totaling at least 30 semester hours credit, at the Temple School of Dentistry.

To be eligible for consideration, King's students must have completed six semesters of fulltime study, totaling at lest 90 semester hours of credit in King's major program in biology drafted the agreement.

They must show proof of satisfying King's core curriculum requirements for the baccalaureate program, must give evidence of exceptional academic achievement in the undergraduate program, and demonstrate competency in the subject matter preparatory to and requisite for the pursuit of

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
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
