own cards.

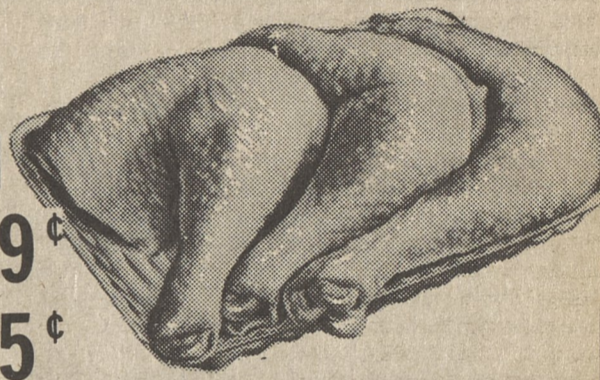

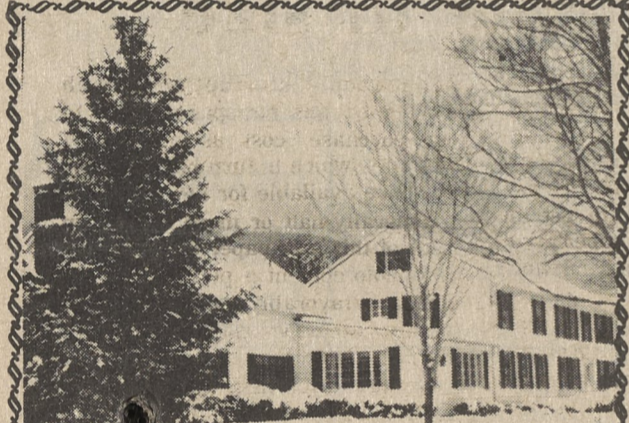
