Township septic tank installation fee raised

Dallas Township supervisors voted Monday night to raise from \$25 to \$100 the fee for the inspection required to grant septic tank installation.

The fee change came on a suggestion from newly-licensed the supervisor's regular May meeting.

Kozik stated that he recommended the fee hike based on new Department Environmental Resources specifications requiring a back hoe and perculator test, along with their approval of forms before permits can be granted.

The supervisors advised the four Parrish Heights residents that Solicitor Frank Townend would draw up a petition, with spaces for all residents whose property touched the proposed road and u-turn. The residents could circulate the petition and sign or not sign.

Townend explained that it was not necessary that all residents sign the petition, but added the supervisors would probably work on an area were all the residents requested their help,

Phil Walter, chairman of the supervisors, stated that he would

request. Walter said he did not feel the supervisors or the township should be responsible to pay someone for the right of way, an action which might be necessary if all residents with property access to the road did not

The supervisors finally decided to have the petition drawn up by their solicitor and allow the residents to decide. If the take over is granted it will be for "a good dirt road." with a

Announcement was also made at the meeting that a decision had not been reached as of the meeting date of the supervisors two court cases. The two cases were heard last month in the Luzerne County courts by Judge Richard Bigelow. One involves the supervisors "furlough" of two police officers and the second is a request by a taxpayer, Ted Krohn, to have the list of delinquent sewer payments in the township made a part of the public record.
