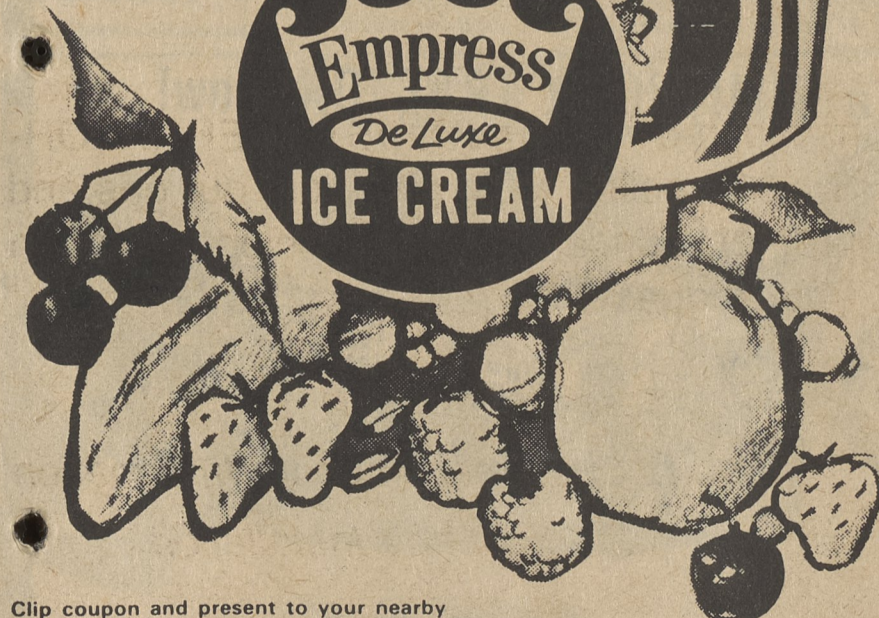


The airman will receive specialized training in the communications electronics field at Kessler AFB, Miss., before returning to his ANG unit at Willow Grove, Pa.
