The buffet table was arranged with an umbrella and favors of pink, white and blue.

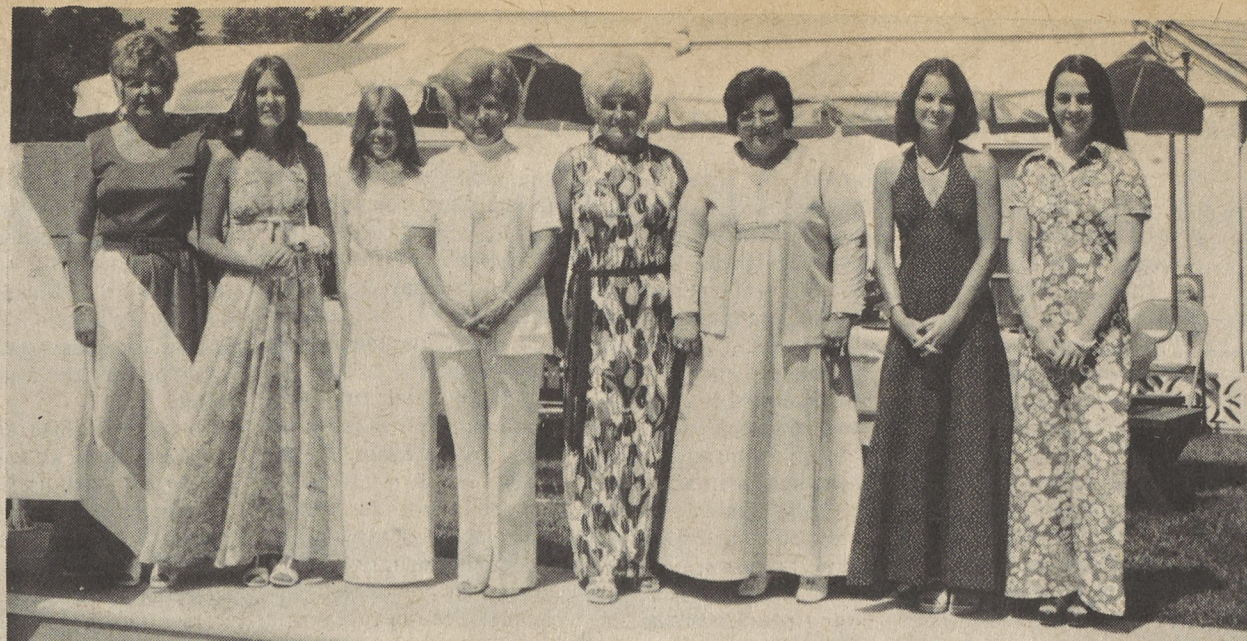

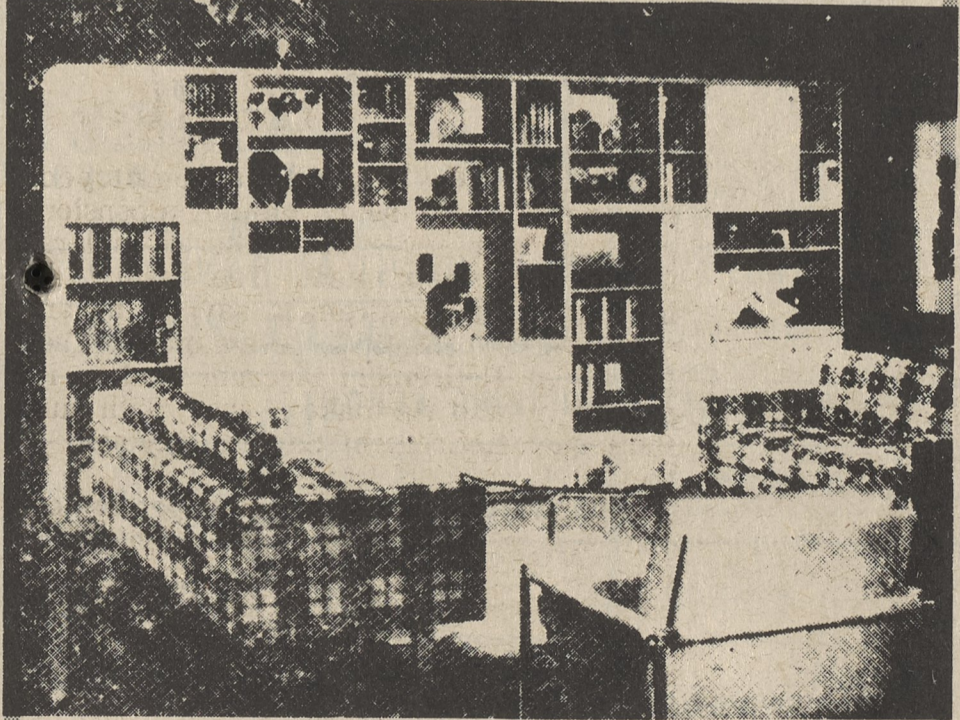
