Knights lose showdown with O'Reilly defense

"We had a great game defensively but we stunk offensively. I'm disappointed," said Lake Lehman Coach Rich Gorgone after he reviewed films of his team's Saturday loss to Bishop O'Reilly.

The Knights came out on the short end of a 6-0 score during a home game Saturday afternoon with the Queensmen.

"We've got to be able to run the option and we've got to be able to pass," Gorgone noted. The Bishop O'Reilly defense effectively stymied the Knights, holding the home team to a minus three yards rushing for the afternoon, sacking Knight quarterback Chris Yanchick for several losses, intercepting two Yanchick passes and causing one fumble deep in Lehman territory which turned into the game's only touchdown.

The Knights completed the game with a net total offense of 81 yards, thanks to 84 yards passing as Yanchick completed five of 17 for the day. Lake Lehman receiver Tom Snell broke a long gainer late in the game, with about one and one-half minutes remaining, but the next two comeback pass attempts fell incomplete.

Gorgone said, "The first was a square out where Yanchick gives a pump fake. The defensive halfback took the fake and our receiver was in the clear. The next play we were wide open (again)."

The pass attempts were the end of the Knights comeback hopes as the Queensmen's Brian Judge intercepted the next pass in the closing moments of play.

Bishop O'Reilly's only score came early in the third quarter when Lake Lehman fumbled deep in its own territory. John Reseter recovered and, soon after, Joe Onzik ran the ball in from the two-yard line. "We make a lot of mistakes," acknowledged Gorgone.

Gorgone complimented the play of defenders Bob Cummins and Nick Brin and

Rocky Knorr, both tackles. "They played a real nice game," he said. "Cummins was really beat after the game but he's doing a super job."

Gorgone acknowledged that his line missed Bill Lavelle, a 200-pounder who was injured during the Meyers game and is expected to miss the remainder of the season. "We're small and have a lot of guys going both ways...Bill could handle any defensive tackle."

"We shoot to beat these A teams," Gorgone said. "We could be 4-0 with a few breaks." All of the Lake-Lehman losses have come by the margin of a touchdown or less, including a 12-7 loss to Meyers, a 17-14 defeat by Nanticoke and the Bishop O'Reilly loss. "Nanticoke is the best we've played so far—they have a lot of nice people."

Gorgone said his Knights will face their fourth consecutive larger opponent this weekend when they meet the Grenadiers of GAR under the lights at Wilkes-Barre's Memorial

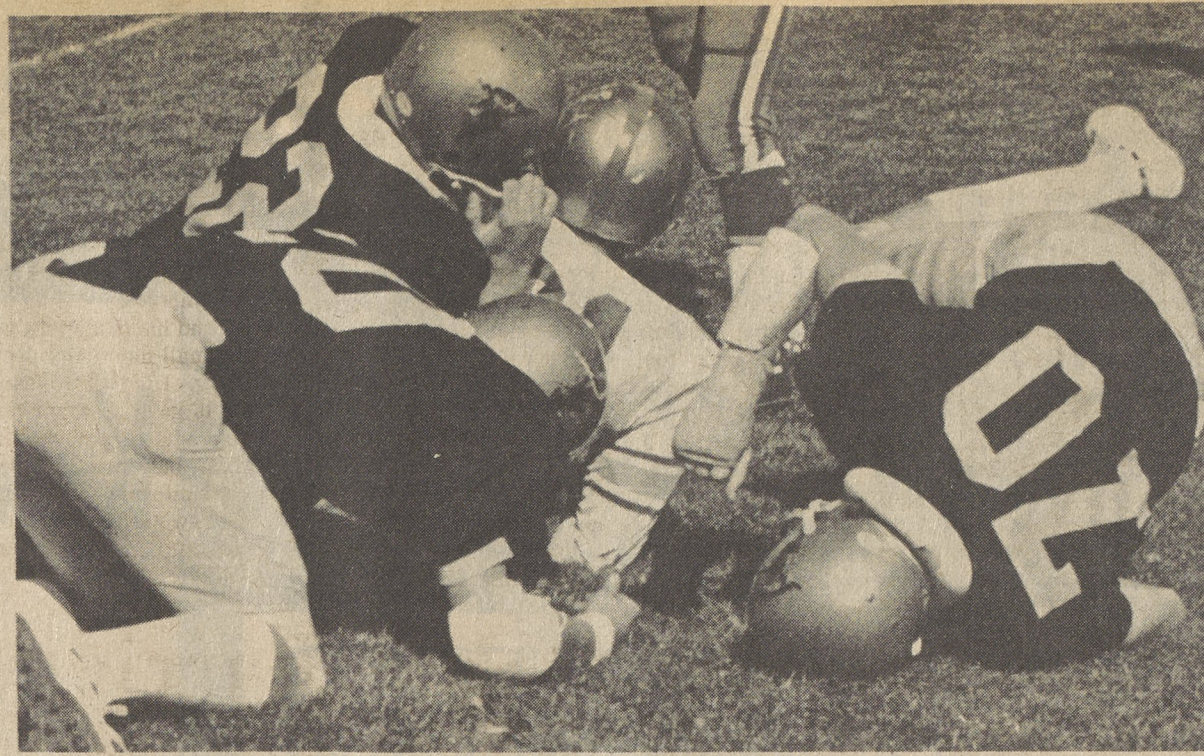
Stadium Saturday night.

"GAR has tackles weighing 270 and 240 pounds, linebackers at 230 and 210 and an offensive line that has to average 220 pounds," the coach said. Grenadier Fullback George Suda is reported to be "big time" material and is strong and fast. Suda is also the 210 pound linebacker, teaming with Bob Tomko, 6-2 and 230, another good player.

Gorgone is also wary of Marcus Blake, the wide receiver for GAR, and noted that GAR quarterback Joe Yansavage "isn't bad either."

The Grenadiers 270-pound tackle is John Kashatus, who is 6-4. He will generally be playing opposite Dave Mahle for the Knights. Mahle is 6-0 and 170 pounds. "We'll have to hit them quick and throw the football," Gorgone said, "and play good defense."

GAR is the first opponent the Knights have faced in Division II of the Wyoming Valley Conference.
