## Postmaster urges early mailing

Local residents are encouraged to begin mailing holiday parcels and greetings as early as possible. Dallas Postmaster Bernard C. Gawlas recommends the following dates by which mail should be deposited to points as follows: Oct. 15, international surface parcels to the Far East; Oct. 25, international surface greeting cards to the Far East; Oct. 28, surface mail to armed forces in Antarctica, Australia, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, New Zealand, Okinawa, Philippines, Taiwan and Thailand.

On Nov. 1, surface and Space Available Mail (SAM) to armed forces in Ethiopia, Iran, Israel, Saudi Arabia and Turkey and international surface parcels to Africa and the Near East;

Nov. 7, Parcel Air Lift (PAL) mail to armed forces in Ethiopia, Iran, Israel, Saudi Arabia and Turkey; Nov. 11, surface and Space Available Mail (SAM) to armed forces in South and Central America, the Congo and Liberia and surface mail to armed forces in Belgium, Denmark, England, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Norway, Netherlands, Portugal and Spain, and international surface parcels to South and Central America and Europe; Nov. 18, Parcel Air Lift (PAL) mail to armed forces in South and Central America, the international surface greeting cards to South and Central America and Europe;

Nov. 20, Space Available Mail (SAM) to armed forces in Antarctica,

Australia, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, New Zealand, Okinawa, Philippines, Taiwan and Thailand; Nov. 25, surface mail and Space Available Mail (SAM) to armed forces in Canada, Greenland, Labrador, Newfoundland and the Azores; Nov. 27 Parcel Airlift (PAL) to armed forces in Belgium, Denmark, England, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Norway, Netherlands, Portugal and Spain and Parcel Air Lift (PAL) mail to armed forces in Antarctica, Australia, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, New Zealand, Okinawa, Philippines, Taiwan and Thailand and Nov. 30, all surface parcels to Alaska and Hawaii should be mailed.

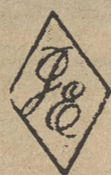

New England: Week begins with heavy rain, then thunderstorms in south and light snow in mountains, clearing but seasonably cold latter part.

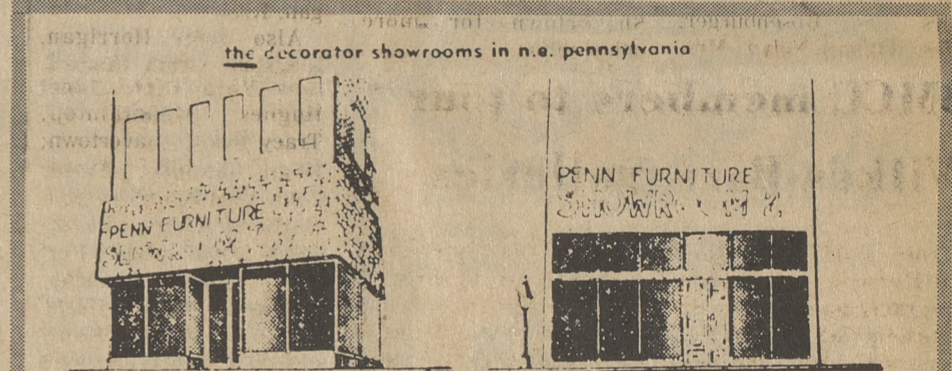
Greater New York-New Jersey: Heavy rain and scattered thunderstorms at first, then less rain, sunny and fair with slight warming over weekend.

Middle Atlantic Coastal: Early week cloudy, cold and rainy, with some snow in west; clear and cold latter part, warming by weekend.



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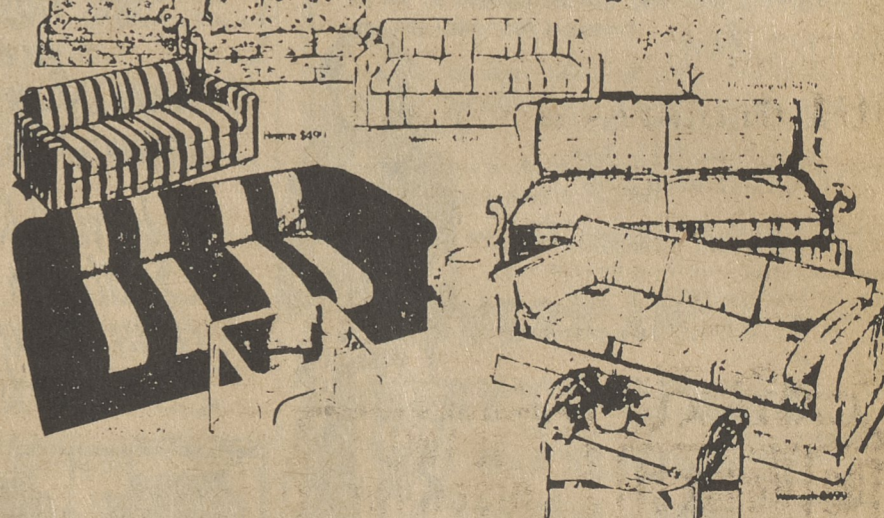
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
