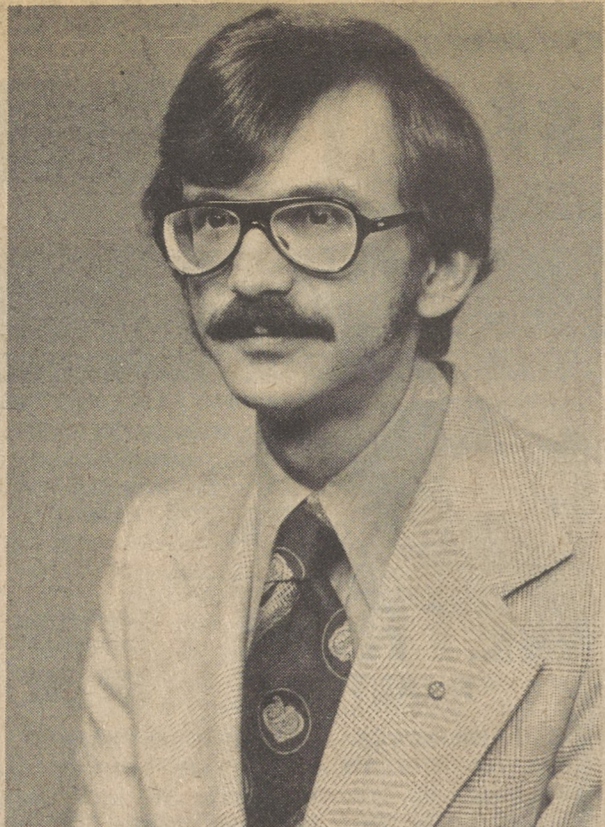
Kingston Township Ambulance Auxiliary will meet Jan. 28, at 8 p.m., in the municipal building, Trucksville.
