Twirling to "Colonel

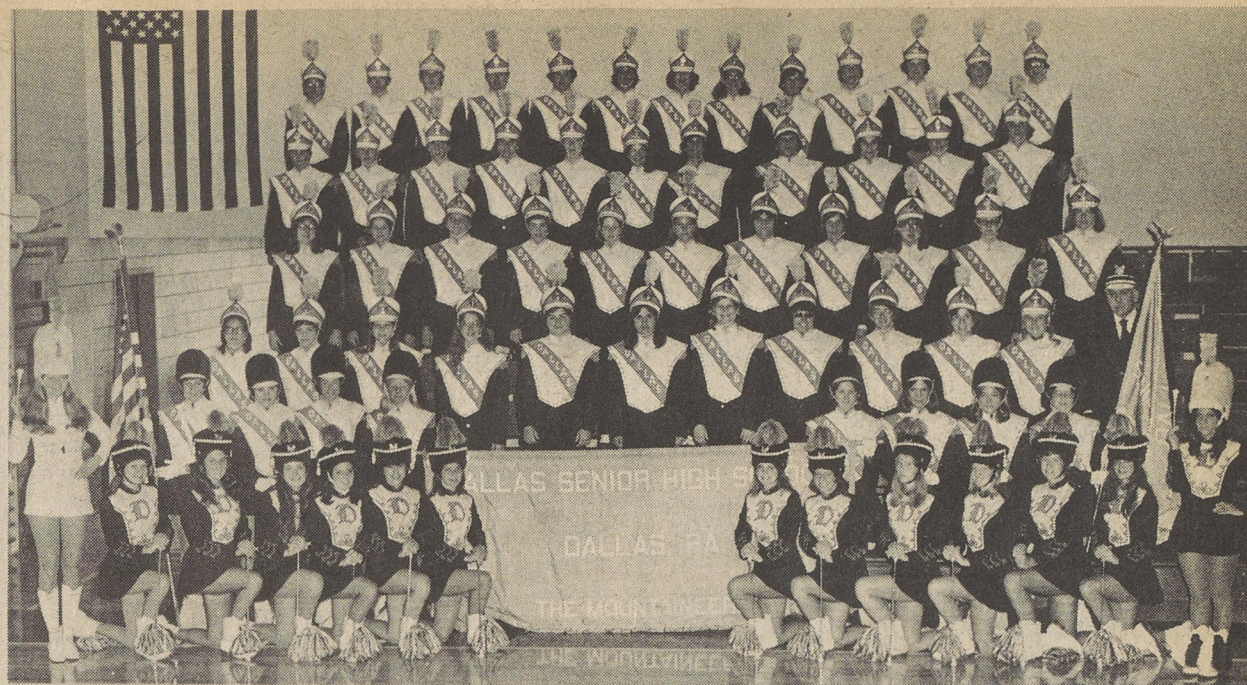

Caterer Bob Coscia is planning these and many other fine menu items as features for the annual event. Proceeds from the \$25 per person or \$50 per couple evening will be directed to the \$12,000 purchase of a liquid gas chromatograph for Wilkes-Barre General Hospital, a machine which will provide blood serum analysis needed in the treatment of epileptics and narcotics patients.

Gourmet chairman for the Rotary Club is Paul Priebe and tickets for the event are available through either him, Coscia, John Barney or any other Dallas Rotarian. Tickets are available to the public

and may also be obtained from Ralph Connor at Popky Insurance on Wyoming Ave., Kingston, or Bruce Slocum at Bruce Slocum Insurance on Main St. Dallas. A maximum of 200 persons will be served at the affair.

Dallas Rotarians have also announced plans to celebrate the club's 49th anniversary during their regular meeting night, March 25. The Tag Masters, a barbershop quartet, will be featured at the event and the Rotary-Anns, wives of the clubmembers, will join in the celebration.

During the past weekend, the club sponsored two fundraisers, a turkey dinner for 800 persons at Dallas High School and play performance at Wilkes College. Proceeds from the two events and the upcoming dinner all go to the chromatograph.

Connor, president of the Dallas club, invited public
