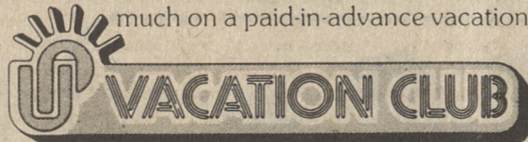
The trail ride committee is the get together and meet with Butch Grey at a convenient vtime for everyone. Please have a time and place to meet in mind.
