Hennebault national champ, to wrestle for U. S.

Walt "Bud" Hennebault copped an A.A.U. National Free-Style Wrestling Championship in the 148 pound class this weekend and earned an invitation

from the A.A.U. to wrestle for the United States Junior Olympic Wrestling Team on a tour of Europe.

Bud is one of only two boys from Pennsylvania to receive an invitation to join the A.A.U. tour from Aug. 1 through Aug. 16. Matt Fornicola, son of Keystone Jr. College Wrestling Coach Larry Fornicola, is the second athlete to receive the bid.

The team will tour a number of countries in Europe and will wrestle approximately five nights a week. This is the first time a wrestler from this area has been invited to wrestle on the team.

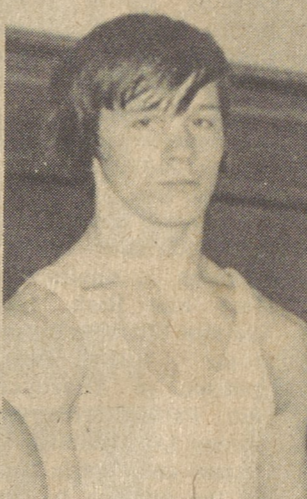
Hennebault won the A.A.U. National at Ursinus College last weekend by defeating five opponents, one of them twice.

In his first bout, he decided William Hinman of New Jersey, 3-1. His second win was over Steve Gibble, N.J. by a 4-3 score. He outwrestled Mark Tyra, Ky., 12-2 and Phil Speras,

New England, 6-1. He went on to take Glen Ray of Ohio, 5-1, in the fifth bout of the tournament. In the finals, he again went up against Gibble of New Jersey and decided him 3-1.

In a letter to Hennebault, the chairman of the A.A.U. tournament, Michael L. Smith, emphasized the enlightening cultural as well as athletic experience the trip would be for the young athlete. He informed him that the cost to Hennebault would be \$659, all inclusive, and urged that he ask support and assistance from community groups. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hennebault Jr., Harveys Lake, Hennebault will be a sophomore in September at Lake-Lehman High School. He also was district champ in Division II Junior High Tourney fan three years.

Arts and Crafts for children will be held Mondays at 9:30 a.m. and Thursdays at 1 p.m. Crafts for teens will be Wednesdays at 3:30 p.m. A basketball league will be run at the center for men. Games will be played Sundays and Thursdays at 6 p.m. A co-ed volleyball league will also be formed. Games will be played Tuesdays at 6 p.m. Registration for both basketball and volleyball will be held until June 23. Basketball instruction and games for younger boys and girls will be held Wednesday at 1 p.m. Baton twirling instruction will also be given at this same time.

Gymnastics and tumbling instruction will be Tuesdays at 1 p.m. A Story Time for very young children will be held Fridays from 3 to 4 p.m.

Many special programs and activities are now in the planning stages. Nature hikes, a trip to a farm, bowling and miniature golf trips, bike hikes, movies and many other activities are planned for the summer.

must be at least five years of age.

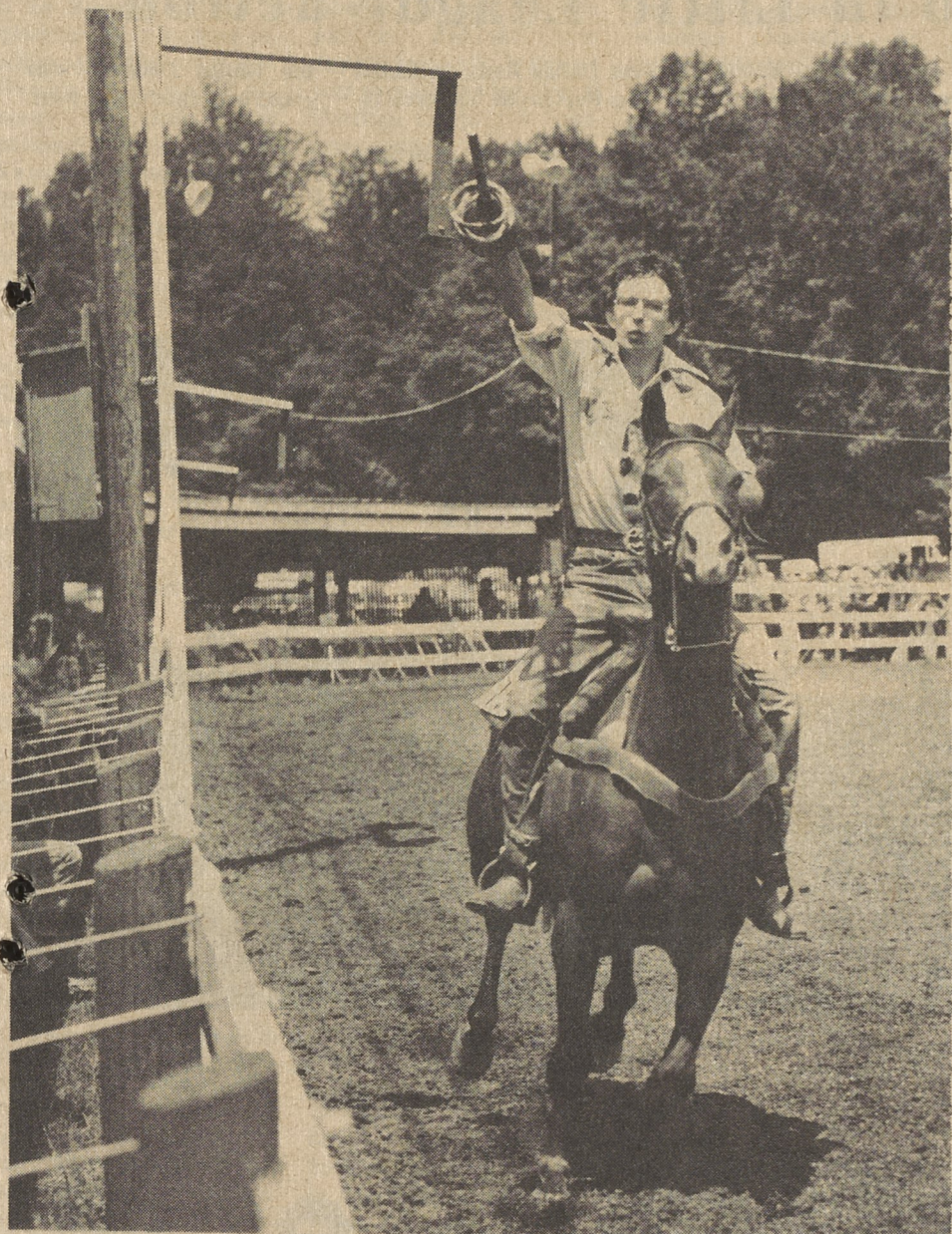
