

Jonathan Davis volunteers recall founders

The Jonathan R. Davis Volunteer Fire Company of Idetown, among the youngest of companies in the Back Mountain had its inception in 1959 when Albert G. Davis offered the use of a carriage house surrounding property near Idetown corners to interested area residents. The group met in July at the home of Bernard C. Banks, to consider the Davis offer. An affirmative vote was step one in the formation of this new fire company which would be a memorial to Davis' father, Jonathan R. Davis. The group met again on Nov. 18, 1959 and on Dec. 12, 1959 a prepared application for charter was read, accepted and signed.

This application filed in Book 20, pages 397, 398 and 399 of the Luzerne County Court of Common Pleas, bears the signatures of John W. Hewitt, J. Sheldon Cave, Andrew R. Lavix, Edgar M. Darby, Willis E. Ide, Ernest L. Fritz, William A. Casterline, Harold S. Donnelly, and William A. Valentine (solicitor).

First officers were then appointed for the company. They were president, J. Sheldon Cave; vice-president, Edgar M. Darby; secretary, John M. Hewitt; treasurer, Paul Dorris; financial secretary, B.C. Banks; fire chief, Willis E. Ide; assistant chief, Harold S. Donnelly; and captain, William A. Casterline.

The charter signers and first officers were immediately joined by a large group of concerned men and renovations and a building addition were immediately begun on the carriage house. By January 1960 progress on the converted carriage house was sufficient to allow the company to use the newly built garage area.

At this time a dual presentation was held at the fire hall with Albert G. Davis giving the company their first piece of fire fighting equipment, a 1959 Howe pumper. The second presentation was a check for \$500 given by Richard Williams Sr. on behalf of the Harveys Lake Lions Club.

Shortly after the fire company charter was approved, in May, 1960, a ladies auxiliary was organized. The first officers for the auxiliary were Mrs. Doris Margellina, president; Mrs. Marshall Patton, vice-president; Mrs. Helen Lavix, secretary; Mrs. Naomi Davis, financial secretary; and Mrs. Alverna Anesi, treasurer.

In 1962 a used cab and chassis was purchased from the Stegmaier Brewery for a nominal fee. Fireman William Waggoner and several others began building a 1400 gallon water tank which was then mounted on the chassis along with the necessary equipment.

In 1966 a newer chassis was purchased and the tank and related apparatus was transferred to it. A special feature notable when passing this fire hall on Route 415 is the Idetown World War II Honor Roll which stands on the front lawn surrounded by flowers and crowned by an American flag. Purchased by donations of residents and dedicated on Decoration Day 1945 it was originally located at Idetown Corners and was moved to its present location in June 1964 when the company assumed charge of maintenance.

In 1966 Davis was so impressed with the progress of this organization that he relinquished the \$1 (one dollar) per year rental and deeded the building and property to the fire company.

In 1972 an adjoining piece of property was purchased and in 1973 Al Zim presented the company with a 1962 Cadillac ambulance. This new piece of equipment brought into full view the need for more garage space. In the spring of 1973 a new addition was begun which doubled the size of the existing building.

In 1974 a new 400 gallon per minute portable pump and 15 complete sets of bunker gear (helmet, bunker coat, boots, gloves and face shield) were added to the company inventory. In 1975, 600 feet of 2½ inch hose was put on the pumper, along with a portable fight generator and lights which was received from the Harveys Lake Lions Club and in 1976 5 more sets of bunker gear have been acquired.

In addition to completing their new building the membership has given hours to attending various fire schools, answering fire and rescue calls, training, maintaining their trucks and equipment, competing at the firemen's competition featured at the fall fair and working on their major fund raising activities. During the early years of the organization a homecoming festival was held each summer and coin cards were distributed and




