King's lists more continuing ed classes

Classes in biology and chemistry will be among the continuing education offerings at King's College with the start of the fall semester Sept. 1. Studies in Contemporary Biology will be taught Monday nights from 6:30 to 9 by Thomas V. Tobin of the biology department. This will provide through lectures, discussion, and readings some understanding of the process and content of con-

temporary biology. Cases will be chosen for investigation which are currently exciting, and are indicative of the rapid progress being made in biology, and demonstrate the pervasive influence of modern biology on society. It is a course for non-science majors. In chemistry, Dr. Griphapati Mitra, professor of chemistry, will teach basic concepts in chemistry. Also intended for non-science majors, the Thursday night course will offer chemical principles that direct the student to an understanding of the basic facts and theories on which the science of chemistry depends.

Lehman tells plans for log cabin use

The Lehman Township Bicentennial Council's Horizon '76 committee, co-chaired by Joseph Ellsworth and Kathryn Gregory, have completed the initial stage of the outdoor environmental classroom. The log cabin has been designed and built specifically for the use of Lake-Lehman elementary students, although the public is welcome to enjoy it.

Several activities and special kits have already been put together for use by the district's elementary people. Included are activities of tree identification (the woods adjoining the cabin have several labeled trees), tree ring analysis, and identification of local rock types.
