L-L schools offer senior pass

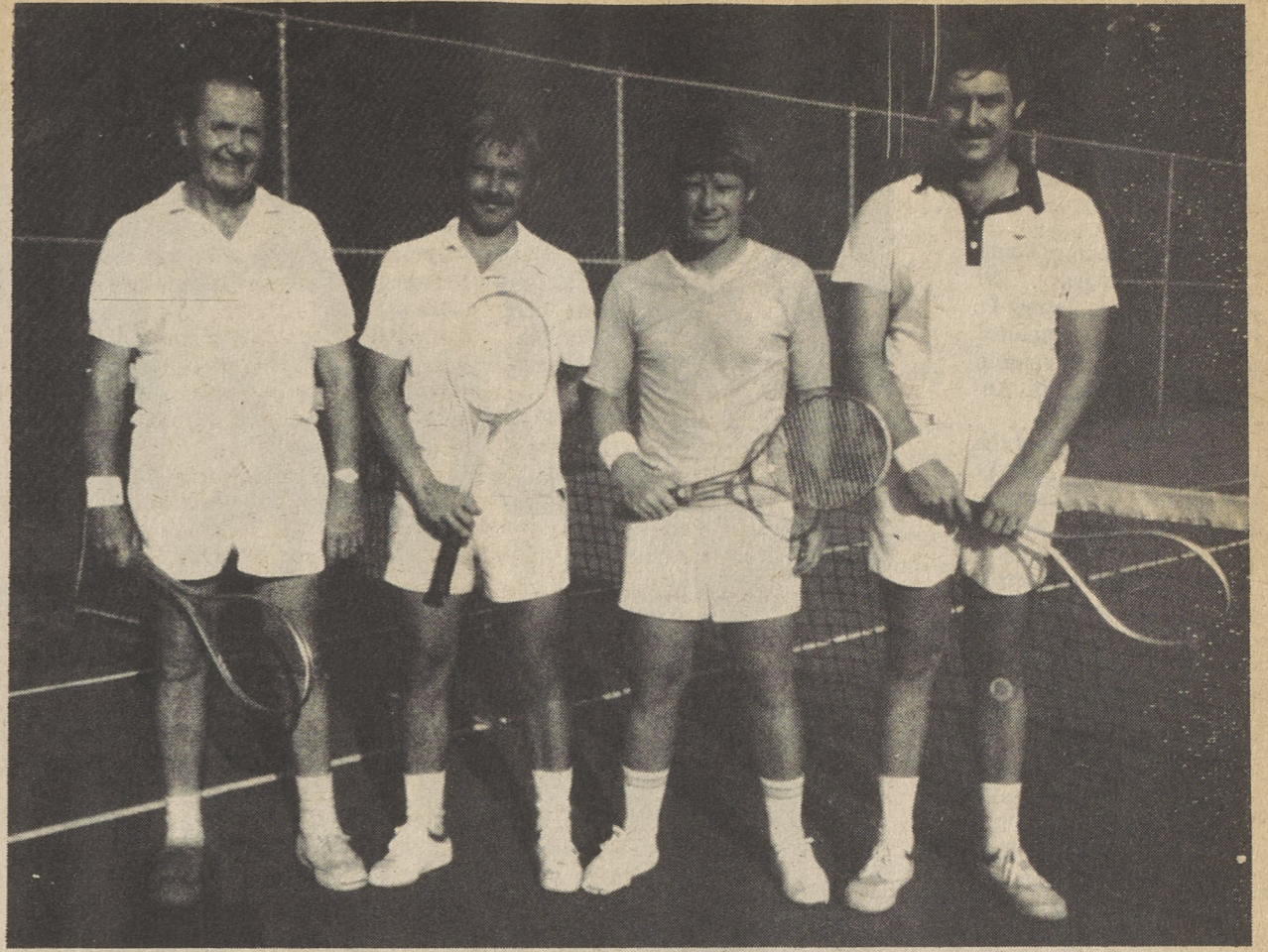
As of Sept. 1 all senior citizens (65 years or older) residing in the Lake-Lehman School District will be admitted without charge to all events
