Dr. Klein, author of Community Dynamics and Mental Health, directed a pioneer demonstration center in community mental health located in Wellesley, Massachusetts. Educator and practioner, Dr. Klein has taught at the Harvard School of Public Health and Boston University. He has also served as psychologist at Berkeley State Mental Hygiene Clinic and at Massachusetts General Hospital. At present, Dr. Klein is a consultant to various community mental health centers, industry, city planning boards, and school districts.
