Families falling within these scales, or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches and-or free milk for their children. Unusual circumstances and hardships include unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of reported income, special education expenses due to mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses.

Each additional family member

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If families have such children and wish to apply for such meals and milk, they should contact the school. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each

Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The easyto-complete form requests information that school officials need to determine

economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect a family's ability to pay for school meals and-or milk The information provided on the application will be held confidential and will be used only for the determining of eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy, the Coordinator of School Nurses will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official, he or she may request, orally or in writing 675-5201, Dr. Linford A. Werkheiser, Superintendent, Dallas School District, Dallas, for a hearing to appeal the decision. Hearing procedures are outlined in


