Hunter safety course planned at Dallas

N.J. Molski, supervisor, Pennsylvania Game Commission, Dallas, has announced that a hunter safety training course will be held at the Pennsylvania Game Commission, located on Memorial Highway, Dallas, on Saturday, Sept. 18.

The entire course will be given on that date. Instructions will start at 9 a.m. and last until 2 p.m. There will also be a hunter safety training course on Saturday, Sept. 25 from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m., at the Edwardsville Borough Municipal Building, Main Street, Edwardsville.

Youths who will be hunting in Pennsylvania for the first time this year are urged to take advantage of the opportunity to take this training. In order to qualify for Pennsylvania hunting license, a person under the age of 16 years must present either evidence that he held a hunting license in Pennsylvania or another state in a prior year or a certificate of competency showing that he had successfully completed a course of instruction in the safe handling of firearm and bows and arrows.

This course will be conducted by District Game Protector Edward Gdosky and other NRA Instructors.
