Miliauskas was selected for this position by the Susquehanna County Music Educators. He will be directing a mass band of 100 of the top musicians

from six Susquehanna County high schools.

The students who will be performing on Friday evening have been selected because of their talent and capabilities. As participants they will appear on stage in the uniform of their respective schools.

Schools represented include Susquehanna High School, Bill Pierce,

director; Blue Ridge High School, John Manchester, director; Forest City High School, Peter Houie, director; Mountain View High School, Hendrick Marr, director; Elk Lake High School, MaryJo Zahradink, director; and the host—Montrose High School, Dean Houck, host director.

Miliauskas has been band director at Lake Lehman High School for the last 24 years. Under his leadership and direction, the band has received national recognition and won over 100 awards which include first place trophies in each of the following categories: concert, marching, field, twirling, color guard, and drum major.

They have participated in the Eagles vs. Browns opener in Philadelphia, the Cherry Blossom Festival in Washington D.C., the National Apple Blossom Festival in Winchester, Va., the Blossom Festival and the Miss U.S.A. Parade in Niagara Falls, the Kentucky Derby Festival in Louisville, Ky. and for many years have participated in the Pagaent of Bands at Sherbourne, N.Y.

Among the many distinctions which Miliauskas and his band have received are two from the government of Pennsylvania. They received a proclamation from the state Senate and were honored by former Governor William Scranton.

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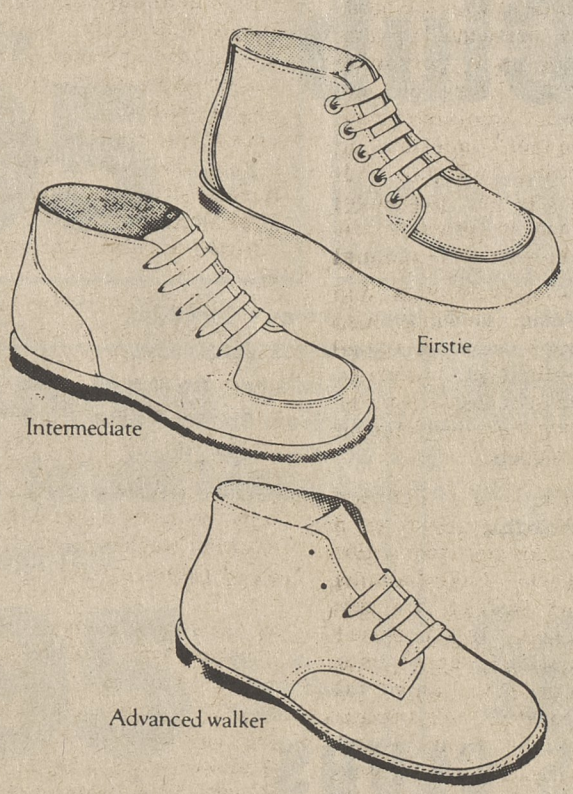
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
