CM social work program accredited

The Council on Social Work Education has granted accreditation to College Misericordia's Social Work program, it was announced by Thomas J. O'Neill, Chairperson of the Behavioral Sciences and Social Work Department.

The professional approval adds Misericordia to the ranks of some 15 other colleges and

universities in the state with the accreditation and gives it the distinction of being the only college in the Wyoming Valley with a CSWE-accredited social work curriculum.

The accreditation means several advantages for Misericordia students, O'Neill indicated. First, he said, employers prefer graduates of an accredited program; second, in many

states and in the federal service, graduates of accredited programs enter service at a higher grade and salary; third, graduates are eligible for membership in the National Association of Social Workers; and finally, graduates of an accredited program may shorten the time required for post graduate work from two years to one year.
