USA, aging office urge '3rd party' note

In order to prevent the tragic deaths of ill or impoverished persons, the Public Utility Commission of Pennsylvania now requires gas, water and electric companies to allow customers the option of deisignating a "Third Party" to be notified if there is a possibility of shut-off of services.

The "Third Party" is not financially liable. Although

not required by law, many telephone companies have volunteered to provide this service as well.

The Luzerne-Wyoming Counties Office for the Aging said such notification is especially important for persons 60 years of age and older who may not have close friends or relatives. The office has reached an agreement with

Pennsylvania Gas & Water, Penelec, Bell Telephone and Commonwealth Telephone Companies to

allow persons 60 and over to simply name the Office for the Aging as their "Third Party" -- no authorized signature is required.

The forms for "Third Party notification" are mailed to customers of gas, Pennsylvania Power & water and electric utilities Light, U.G.I. Corporation, along with their bills at least once a year. Persons who have not received one may contact the nearest office of the utilities.

Customers of telephone utilities must request "Third Party notification" forms by calling or writing their telephone company. Persons 60 and over are urged to take advantage of this option. Anyone under 60 may designate the United Services Agency as "Third Party".


