

UGI to spend \$34.5 million on investment

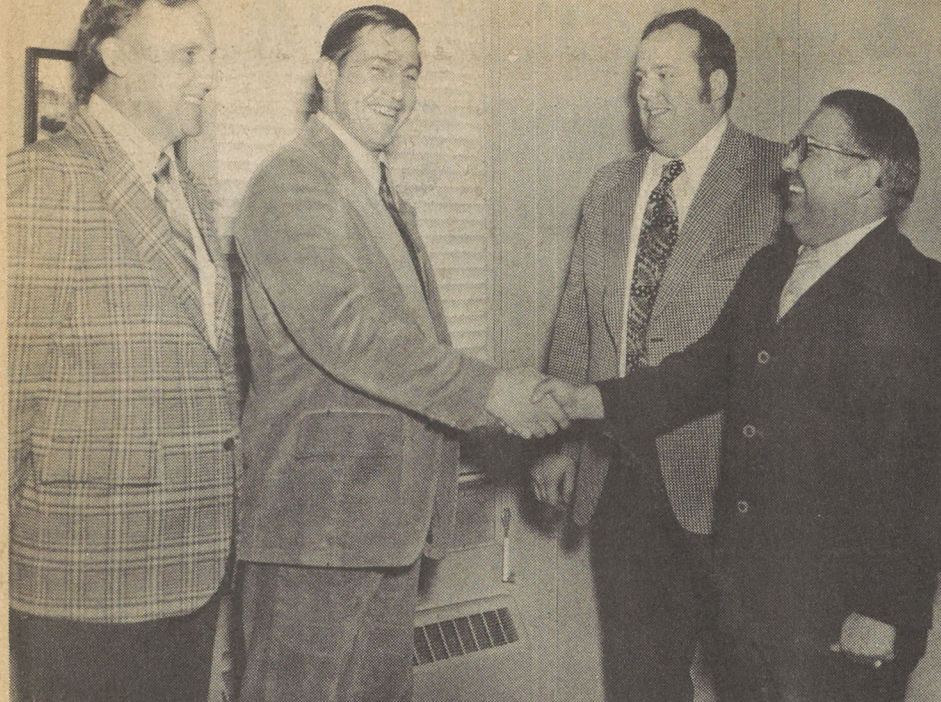
UGI Corp. will spend \$34.5 million during 1977 for capital projects and other investments. The expenditures will exceed 1976 outlays by 12 percent, UGI said in its annual report. The company said that it expects internally-generated funds to provide approximately \$22.2 million of the total requirement and the balance to be obtained through the sale of new debt.

As previously reported, UGI's earnings for the 12 months ended Dec. 31, 1976, increased 23 percent to \$10,688,000, or \$2.64 per share. Operating revenues rose 26 percent to \$199,221,000.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ZONING MAP OF THE BOROUGH OF HARVEY'S LAKE, LUZERNE COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA.
The Borough Council of Harvey's Lake, Luzerne County, Pennsylvania, hereby ordains as follows:
SECTION 1. The Zoning Map of Harvey's Lake Borough, Luzerne County, Pennsylvania, dated June, 1974, and heretofore attached to, and made a part of the Zoning Ordinance of the Borough of Harvey's Lake, as adopted September 5, 1974, is hereby amended to change the following described parcel of land, commonly known as O'Connell's Twin Lakes, from an R-2 Zoning Classification to a C-3 Zoning Classification.

ALL THAT CERTAIN lot, piece or parcel of land, situate in the Borough of Harvey's Lake, County of Luzerne, and State of Pennsylvania, bounded and described as follows, to wit:

BEGINNING at the southeasterly corner of land, now or late of the heirs of James W. Rhodes, deceased, in the northerly line of the Public Road leading from the Outlet Section of Harvey's Lake, now known as Carpenter Road; THENCE along land of the heirs of James W.
